#### A NEW WORKBAG.

Everything on the Inside Instead of

has everything in it, this bag has everything outside, leaving room in the bag for work or mending. The advantage of having utensils in plain sight is obvious. Make an ordinary workbag, using any favorite pattern. Small brass rings are fastened at in-tervals around the inside of the rim and the various articles suspended from them by ribbons. The cases for thread and silk are five inches long and two and one eighth inches wide.

This size holds three spools. The case holding black and white darning cotton is the same length, but two and one-half inches wide. A spool of linen

## INDIANS SHOOT POLICE

Fusilade of Bullets Greets Constables Sent to Make Arrest.

Two Were Wounded and Had Narrow Escape From Death-Indian Who Made Savage Assault Upon Woman Resists Capture-Armed Force Sent From Pembroke to Bring Them In -Indians Usually Peaceable.

Pembroke, Aug. 21.—In attempting to arrest an Indian on the Golden Lake Reserve, two Pembroke constables were fired upon by a party of Indians, with the result that the constables had narrow escapes. Both were slightly wounded.

A special force of constables was despatched from here on the noom train yesterday to effect the arrest of the hostile Indians.

The constables are heavily armed. There are 100 Indians on the Golden Lake Reserve, and they have always been considered industrious and peaceable.

The quiet of the reserve was disturbed on Friday last, when an Indian named Serazan arrived on a visit. He tarried too long at the wine and the firewater on Saturday, and this roused his savage nature to such a pitch that he made a violent assault on one of the Indian women, a Mrs. Seymour, lacerating her face and beating her badly.

Word was sent to Pembroke, and Constables Young and Dixon were sent out to arrest the Indian. When the constables arrived at the house Dixon called out to the inmates to open the door. They replied they would not, but would shoot any person who attempted to get in.

While Young was endeavoring to break open the door, Dixon tried to gain an entrance through the window. Almost immediately there was a fusilade of bullets, one of which tore Dixon's chest. Dixon fell to the ground.

When Young came to Dixon's assistance the firing started again and

When Young came to Dixon's assistance the firing started again and one bullet pierced the constable's hat, grazing his forehead.

As the house was occupied by a number of armed parties and Constable Dixon was wounded, the constables decided to return to Pembroke for assistance.
