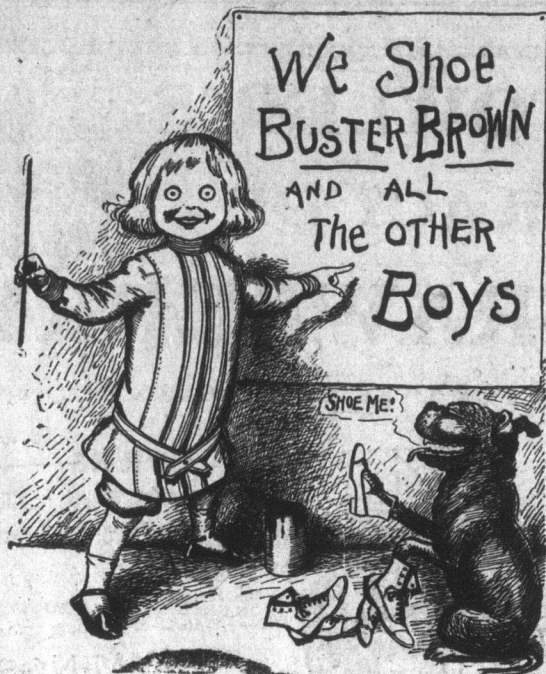

ONTARIO RIFLE MATCHES.

Brought to a Conclusion For 1904-Tait-Brassey Match the Feature of the Day—Gowinski Match.

Toronto, Aug. 26.—Under lowering skies and with a fair breeze blowing the annual O. R. A. matches were brought to a conclusion yesterday.

The great event of the day was the Tait-Brassey or militia match. Keen interest centered therein, and in view of the number of crack shots grouped together in different teams of six and companies of four, the outcome was awaited with more eagerness than that displayed in any other contest. The highest quartette of individual scores were: O. R. Sergt. J. Phillips, R. G., 100, \$20; O. R. Sergt. J. H. Simpson, R. G., 100, \$15; Pte. W. T. Willoughby, Australia, 98, \$12; Pte. D. C. Draper, 43rd D. C. O. R., 98, \$10.

AT PETAWAWA.

Dominion Government Accepts Ontario's Offer of a Free Site For New Training Ground.

Ottawa, Aug. 26.—The Dominion Government will accept the offer of the Ontario Legislative Assembly, of a free training ground for artillery and infantry at Petawawa, one of the most desirable grounds on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway for that purpose.

It was learned yesterday morning that an inspection had been made of the Kazabazua site, the one first proposed this spring, and that for many reasons the place was considered unsuitable.

The settlers on the site objected to the place being turned into a military training place and, besides, the Quebec Government refused to let the grounds pass into the control of the Dominion for less than \$50,000 or \$60,000.

CANTERBURY IN MONTREAL.

Elaborate Program Arranged For His Stay in That City.

Montreal, Aug. 26.—According to present arrangements the Archbishop of Canterbury on his arrival here Sept. 1 will be met by the Archbishop of Montreal and the members of the special reception committee. He will be accompanied by Sir George Drummond, and in the afternoon will be taken for a drive over Mount Royal and to see the principal points of interest.

In the evening a service will be held in Christ Church Cathedral, where Archbishop Bond will present an address to the primate and the latter will preach.

Following the service a reception will be held. On the following morning service will be held at the cathedral, and at 1 o'clock the primate will be tendered a luncheon at the Windsor Hotel. A garden party will be given in the afternoon, and in the evening he will be dined at Bishop's Court.

Dr. Willoughby Again.

Warkworth, Aug. 26.—The Conservatives of East Northumberland met yesterday. There was a good representation from all over the county. Dr. Willoughby was unanimously chosen to be the standard bearer for this riding.

Bounty on Petroleum.
Ottawa, Aug. 26.—Regulations for the payment of the bounty of 14 cents per gallon on crude petroleum produced in Canada have been approved in Council and are now being prepared for distribution.

Died at 195.
Washington, Ga., Aug. 26.—Caesar Booker, believed to be 125 years old, died here Wednesday. He came to Georgia ninety years ago as a slave from Virginia. Caesar leaves six children, the oldest of whom is 96 years old.

Alexandria Hotel Burned.
Alexandria, Aug. 26.—A serious fire occurred here about 4 o'clock yesterday morning, when the Grand Union Hotel and the large general store of D. MacCrea were burned.

BATTLE RAGING

(Special to The Planet.)

St. Petersburg, Aug. 25.—A dispatch from Liao Yang under date of August 25, says the Japanese eastern forces began a forward movement August 24, eight companies going, on the main Liao Yang road, in the direction of Liandianshan.

The Russian outposts held their positions, the first continuing yesterday. The result is not stated, but it is understood the Second and Twelfth Japanese guards divisions are participating.

Liao Yang, Aug. 25.—(Delayed in transmission.)—A big battle commenced yesterday 20 miles east of Liao Yang.

The Russian front from the Taitse River south was engaged.

The fighting continues to-day at Liandianshan, 23 miles southeast of Liao Yang.

The Japanese are attacking.
