AT PETAWAWA.

Dominion Government Accepts Ontario's Offer of a Free Site For New Training Ground.

Ottawa, Aug. 26.—The Dominion Government will accept the offer of the Ontario Legislative Assembly, of a free training ground for artillery and infantry at Petawawa, one of the most desirable grounds on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway for that purpose.

It was learned yesterday morning that an inspection had been made of the Kazabazua site, the one first proposed this spring, and that for many reasons the place was considered unsuitable. ered unsuitable.

BATTLE RAGING

St. Petersburg, Aug. 23.-A dispatch from Liao Yang under date of August 25, says the Japanese eastern forces began a forward movement August 24, eight companies going, on the main Liao Yang road, in the direction of Liandiansian.

The Russian outposts held their positions, the first continuing yester-day. The result is not stated, but it is understood the Second and Twelfth Japanese guards divisions are participating.
