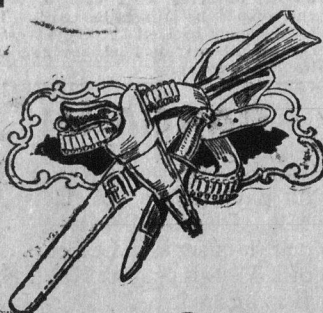

R. L. BORDEN SPEAKS OUT

At Conservative Labor Day Gathering At Sydney C. B.

ATTACKS GOVERNMENT

Sydney, N. S., Sept. 4.—Graham Fraser, the steel magnate, threw open his grounds yesterday and several thousand Conservatives, men, women and children, roamed at will over the vast estate. The forenoon was devoted to sports of various kinds and from 2 o'clock in the afternoon until 5 there were political speeches by R. L. Borden, M. P., and other prominent leaders of the Conservative party. Mayor McCormick of Sydney Mines presided.

Mr. Borden spoke from the broad verandah which encircles the Fraser residence. Some seven hundred Conservative voters were present, eager to hear and quick to applaud the speech. Beyond, within sight of the speaker, was a patch of the sea. Mr. Borden began as follows:

Great Question. "The last occasion on which I addressed a Cape Breton audience was immediately before the general elections of 1904. A great question of policy was in issue at that time. We believed then and we still believe that the extension of the I. C. R. to the Georgian Bay and the construction of the new national transcontinental railway as a Government work would have served the interests of the people of Canada infinitely better than the scheme which has been proposed by the Government and ratified by Parliament.

"The issue for the time being was decided against us. The contract with the Grand Trunk Pacific Co. became an accomplished fact and the country must in honor abide by it so long as the other contracting party fairly fulfills its obligations.

"But consider what the ownership of that transcontinental road would have meant to the people of Canada. They and not the capitalists and speculators, would in that case have shared and enjoyed the tremendous increment in value in the road from Winnipeg to the coast, which must ensue from the enormous development of the west. To that increment in value the country was justly entitled, because it is almost on the credit of Canada that the capital for the construction of that road is now being provided under the guarantee of the people of this country. The people will realize the loss more fully when a hundred millions of common stock in the Grand Trunk Pacific and its subsidiary companies sell at 200, although they will not represent one dollar of actual cash invested."

Mr. Borden denounced election frauds and recalled the graft and extravagance of the Laurier Government, including the supplies for the Montcalm and the notorious Arctic.

Mr. Tanner spoke briefly on provincial matters and was followed by R. H. Butts and J. W. Madden.

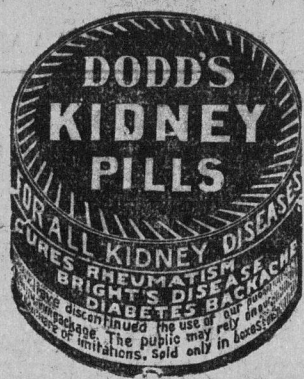

AS A JESUIT PROVINCE

Proposition That Canada Be Separately Established.

Rome, Sept. 4.—The congregation of the Company of Jesus yesterday examined a proposition presented by Father Rudolph Meyer of St. Louis, Mo., for transforming the present Jesuit mission in Canada into a new province. The project had already been studied under the late general, Father Martin, and was favored by him and by Vicar Fredri.

A definite decision is expected to be taken before the congregation dissolves.

WILL DELAY ELECTION

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 4.—The Fielding election case counsel were heard in arguments on the question as to whether the election judges should send their certificate and report to the Speaker of the House of Commons or to the Supreme Court of Canada, to which the present petitioner has taken an appeal on the ruling of the court respecting evidence tendered by the petitioner as to personal charges against respondent.

The judges have just filed their opinions and disagree on the point, the chief justice holding that there being no appeal from the decision declaring the election void, the certificate and report should go to the Speaker, but Judge Russell holds that under the wording of the statute any appeal on any appealable matter arising during the trial requires the trial judges to report to the Court of Appeal.

It is said that the judges, though thus disagreeing in opinion, will unite in a report to the Supreme Court of Canada, and consequently no election can be held in Shetburne-Queen's until the appeal on the personal charges against Mr. Fielding are passed upon by the highest court in the Dominion.

NOT ALONE RESPONSIBLE

Philadelphia, Sept. 4.—"From the evidence in my possession, the collapse of the Real Estate Trust Co. appears to be the result of stupendous looting. I intend to proceed to the limit against the persons liable."

This statement was made by District Attorney Bell, after a day spent in examining the evidence handed to him by Receiver Earle of the defunct Trust company.

That Frank K. Hipple, the suicide president of the institution, was not alone responsible for the crash, both Receiver Earle and District Attorney Bell are satisfied, and arrests may be looked for at any time.
