CANADIAN BORN.

Millionaire Contractors Who Tossed

Timber in Lanark's Limits.

Despatches recently reported the capture of a \$3,000,000 contract from the C. P. R. and a \$7,000,000 one from the Grand Trunk Pacific, by the Foley Brothers of St. Paul. These brothers are natives of Lanark, having been born in Lanark, says The Carleton Place Canadian.

There were four—Timothy, Michael, John and Richard. The last is dead. These brothers began life in the humblest manner in the limits of Mr. Mair of Lanark. They were as poor as crows, except in the matter of intellect and energy. They were born with an aptitude to do things on a big scale.

When they were in the chrysalis of the crow state—45 years ago. In a moment of blooming ambition he accepted a position in the camp where they were engaged. He saw Tim and Mike wielding the cant-hook with her husband, gave the cant-hauler was powerful in the art of log-rolling; indeed, each tossed timber with skill and alacrity. The brothers hitched their chariot to a star, which dropped in St. Paul, where they took deep root and began to spread with a rapidity almost sensational.

Each is a millionaire and each lives in a mansion whose beauty and equipment are beyond the dreams of an Oriental potentate. Mrs. Murphy, when in Superior some time ago called on her husband's youthful friends, accompanied by a sister, who also knew them in those distant days. Timothy Foley married Miss Gubrie of Darling, and she, with her husband, gave the Canadian a royal greeting. T. Foley lives in a home next that of James J. Hill, the noted railway magnate. The brother John is at present visiting in Europe.

Uncovered 48 Skeletons.

While John Fallis, a farmer, living close to the United States boundary, was digging a cellar, he happened upon a gruesome find. The spade of one of his workmen unearthed a human skull. At first it was thought to be from the lonely grave of an Indian, but, upon recommending the excavation, other skulls were met, by evening forty-eight had been taken from the ground. Only two complete skeletons were discovered.

Considerably excited by his mysterious discovery, Mr. Fallis loaded the relics into a wagon and took them to Crystal City, where they were placed in a safe. Doctors pronounced the bones to be those of white men in a good state of preservation.

The consensus of opinion is that the spot had been the scene of some battle with the Indians, and that the victims of the conflict were thrown into a common pit in the haste of flight.

Skulls of Dead Indians.

What is probably the site of an old Indian burying ground was revealed a few days ago when excavating a mound in the C. P. R. station yard at Myrtle, Ont., on the Toronto & Havelock division. The discovery was made by Contractor John Bescom's staff. The ploughs used in reducing the mound uncovered ribs and leg bones, and soon sixteen skulls were turned up. Three of the skulls were sent to Ottawa for scientific examination, and one to Dr. Clendennan at Toronto Junction. Seven were retained by a liverman as they were the same night.

New System of Checking.

The general baggage agents who were recently in session at Cleveland discussed an innovation on baggage checking that will be of great benefit to the traveler. It is proposed to check the baggage at the passengers' residence to the destination at the terminal point. If the railroads in Canada and the United States agree to the proposition it will be put into operation next year.

Port Arthur, July 31.—G. T. P. Engineer Deschene, whose home is in Eastern Canada, is lost in the pathless forest north of Sturgeon Lake, where he had been making preliminary surveys. He had about a dozen men with him and all have been searching for him since last Tuesday.
