culate.

Figures for Ontario are almost as low as for Manitoba, being one paper for every 3,729 persons. The Territories have one paper for every 4,545 inhabitants; Nova Scotia one for every 5,679; tants; Nova Scotta one for every 5,575; Prince Edward Island one for every 6,476 persons; New Brunswick one for every 6,320; and Quebec one for every 12.938.-Printer and Publisher.
