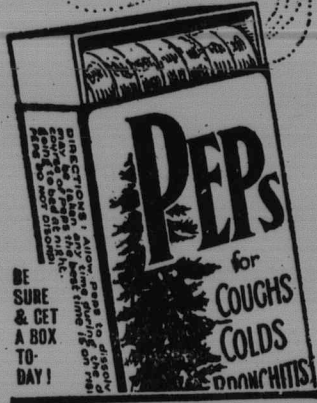

TAKE \$3,000 LIQUOR

AT ST. LEONARDS
Fredericton, Nov. 3.—A seizure of a part carload of liquor of good quality a part carload of liquor consisting of 132 cases of liquor of good quality was made recently at St. Leonards by the preventive service. The shipment was en route to Edmundston from New Carlisle, Que., consigned to a fictitious address. Another seizure made at New Carlisle some time ago is believed to have been part of the same lot. The practice is to land the liquor on the Quebec coast of the Baies des Chaleurs and forward it by C. N. R. The authorities were on the watch for this lot and the value was about \$3,000.

WINTER PROTECTION OF ROSES.

Without ample protection, many rose plants are lost every winter. At the Charlottetown, P. E. I., Experimental Station, hybrid-tea roses that were banked with earth and later covered with dry leaves and rough boards, came through the winter in fine condition. The plants that were only banked with earth, were, as a rule, severely injured and some were killed outright, according to the Report of the Superintendent of the Station for 1923, issued by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.
