THE NATIONAL DEFENCE.

Secretary of War Brodrick Does Not Think British Navy Capable of Offensive Measures.

LETON, Nov. 18.—Mr. Brodrick's speech at Downsbury supplied the only touch of humor that was in a dull week of ecclesiastical politics. It was unobscured humor, derived from his own mental confusion and misadventure. His theory of national defence was explained to the colonial Premier, was restated and was power disseminated on the ground that naval warfare is not an exact science. This was an amusing generalization from the Secretary of War after the evidence supplied in South Africa that neither the Akershow tactics nor the British military system were entirely trustworthy; not to say exact. Instead of supporting the Admiralty theory, that the navy must be strong enough to take the offensive in any war with one or more maritime powers, he contended that the channel could not be cleared and exposed to foreign attack even temporarily, and since the resources of the fleet were uncertain the only safeguard was a large and powerful army for home defence.

The facility with which the Admiralty could convert this argument into an urgent plea for strengthening the navy at a high cost made this passage humorous. Equally ludicrous was his rejoinder to Lord Rosebery's complaint that Lord Kitchener had been sacked off to India, where the services of an ordinary military man would have been adequate, and not placed in charge of the War Office, where reform was urgently needed from top to bottom, that he considered it an unkind and unpatriotic suggestion that a general whose future was so important to the country should be made the target to press criticism and political attack.

THE COAL COMMISSION.

President Mitchell Again on the Stand for Miners.

The Great Length of the Proceedings

Will Have to be Curtailed Says Everybody Connected With Case.

SCRANTON, Pa., Nov. 18.—Another large crowd was in attendance at the superior court today. The authorities began the fourth day's sitting. President Mitchell, who has been on the witness stand since Friday, resumed, and his cross-examination by Wayne MacVeigh for the company was resumed. It was the opinion of the attorney general to-day that some arrangements will have to be made to shorten the enquiry. At the present rate of progress it will take many weeks to hear both sides of the controversy. If counsel take no action it is likely the commission will. The commission's members recognize that President Mitchell is the most important witness the miners have, and they are loath to have matters hurried while he is on the stand. He being the representative of the union, his opinions are looked upon as official and also as reflecting the policy of the organization.

Just before the examination began John T. Lenahan, of Wilkesbarre, counsel for the non-union men who want the commission to consider their case, handed the commission a list of two thousand names of non-union men as his authority for appearing before the arbitration. He did not wish the commission to make the names public at present, but Chairman Gray said that everything filed with the commission is public matter. The names were unofficially handed in and were not made public. He also filed a statement of the non-union men's demands.

GRAND BANQUET

To Be Tendered Mgr. Falconer Previous to His Departure from Canada.

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—Mgr. Falconer will be banqueted here tonight by the Canadian Catholic Union. The Archbishop of Toronto, the Bishops of Hamilton and Toronto, Premier Borden, Mayor Howland will attend, as will many prominent citizens and clergy of Toronto and other places.

Mgr. Falconer left Ottawa for Toronto this morning and will go thence to Buffalo. A very large assemblage gathered at the depot to see him off, including Honrs. Messrs. Scott and Fitzpatrick, and leading ecclesiastics of the church in the city, and students of the University of Ottawa, who attended in a body and made the air resonant with their cry. All present wished him God speed as the train pulled out.

CHOLERA IN THE EAST.

JERUSALEM, Nov. 18.—The cholera epidemic is spreading rapidly. The populations of Gaza and Lydda have been decimated and the people are fleeing flight. At Jaffa, there have been 57 deaths in three days. The disease is raging in neighboring villages. No complete returns of the mortality are available. The people in the stricken districts are in a sad plight and relief is needed everywhere.

THE AUTOMOBILIST.

New York, Nov. 18.—Agitation for a national highway from the Atlantic to the Pacific is the winter programme mapped out at a meeting of the directors of the American Automobile Association. The proposed road is to start at Boston and reach Chicago by way of the Lake cities. From Chicago it is to follow the old overland route by way of Salt Lake City to San Francisco.
