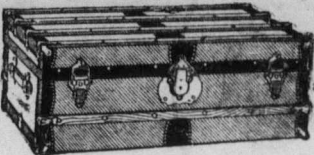

Toronto, Aug. 20.—Martin F. Ryan was re-elected President of the Railway Carmen's Brotherhood.

Battleship Remains Supreme.

Washington, Aug. 20.—Results of bombing tests held off Virginia Capes from June 21 to July 21 failed to displace the battleship from its prominent position as a nation's chief defence at sea.

Say U. S. Against Alliance.

Washington, Aug. 20.—A United States Senator said it is useless to Lloyd George to propose to Washington with any proposition for an alliance between Great Britain, Japan and United States and that it is hardly consistent with the purpose of the League of Nations.

No Change in Irish Situation.

Dublin, Aug. 20.—No visible change in the Irish situation has taken place in consequence of Lord George's speech in the House of Commons yesterday. There has been some move in any quarter of the Sinn Féin indicating a desire to accept the British government's terms.

Ottawa, Aug. 20.—Hon. Hugh Guthrie returned from overseas yesterday.

Robbed Bank at Niagara Falls.

Fishing Sloop Sank.

Rockland, Maine, Aug. 20.—The fishing sloop Minerva sank at the dock yesterday without warning.

Relief for Russian Famine.

Riga, Aug. 20.—The United States and Soviet Russia will sign contracts today for United States relief for Russian famine.

Canadian Steamer Grounded.

Quebec, Aug. 20.—The Canadian steamer Canadian Warrior grounded yesterday. Position not dangerous.

The Steamer Maskinonge Seized.

Quebec, Aug. 20.—Steamer Maskinonge has been seized on a claim of \$600,000 laid by the Canadian Merchant Marine as a result of collision with the Canadian steamer.
