

ARE ON TRIAL FOR MURDER.

Connors, Neelon and Davis Committed This Morning.

They All Plead Not Guilty at the Police Court.

Evidence Much the Same as Given at the Inquest.

The large crowd that gathered outside No. 3 police station this morning expecting to be admitted to the preliminary hearing of the three men held for the murder of Fred Fieldhouse, were doomed to disappointment, for the officials decided to permit none but those having business. Relatives of the prisoners principally women, filled the witness chairs, and followed the trial with the greatest attention. Friends of the three men and others who were there just for curiosity, flocked around the entrance to the station, when the prisoners were marched from the patrol to the cells. Many of them remained outside during the trial to await the result. After the usual business was disposed of the men were brought up from downstairs.

S. F. Washington, K. C., Crown Attorney, conducted the prosecution. At first one lawyer appeared for the three, but to-day each had his own. George S. Kerr is defending Connors, M. J. O'Reilly is acting for Neelon, and Arthur O'Heir for young Davis.

Connors and Neelon frequently conversed during the trial, but neither of them appeared to be worrying as little as Davis. He looked cheerful all the time, and nodded and smiled to his relatives.

The three prisoners arose at the call of their names and the Magistrate read the charge:

"That James Neelon, Michael O'Connors and Sanley Davis stand charged that they did on the 10th day of June, 1905, at, and in the city of Hamilton, murder one Fred Fieldhouse.

"Not guilty," replied all three.

Mrs. Sarah Fairbairn, who keeps the boarding house at 157 Princess street, where the dead man had resided, told about finding him in the wood-shed with his coat under his head and unconscious.

"Fieldhouse had come home drunk before," suggested Mr. Kerr.

"Yes, but he was always very quiet and went to bed without making any noise," replied the witness.

"Had he ever slept in the shed before?" questioned Mr. Kerr.

"No. A side door was always left open."

"For him," asked the lawyer.

"No, for any of them who came home late," was the answer.

The next witness was Dr. John Parry. He told a similar story to the one he related at the inquest. At first he thought Fieldhouse was intoxicated, but soon discovered that there was something seriously wrong. Fieldhouse died in fifteen minutes. The doctor again pointed out that it was quite possible for a man with such injuries to walk from Bay and Barton streets to where he was found. The fractures were caused by a blow or by striking on a smooth surface.

"Could that have been caused by a fall?"

"It would not be impossible."

A new witness was called in the person of Fred Littlewood, a son of the proprietor of the Clyde Hotel. He told about the Englishmen being in the bar, and leaving them outside, after locking up. He went for a walk, but saw nothing of the row.

"Were you on a veranda around there that night?" asked Mr. Kerr.

"No, I was not," he replied.

"Well, then, you were not the man called 'Fred'?"

"No."

Mrs. Strong, who lives on the north east corner of Bay and Barton streets saw three men go south of Barton on Bay street. Two appeared to be chasing one. While the scuffle on the veranda was going on some one said: "Go easy, Fred."

Henry J. McCarthy, one of the men with Fieldhouse on the fatal night, and who received a severe beating in the fight, told his version of the affair, from the time he met Fieldhouse and two friends on Merrick street at 9 o'clock until after midnight, when he was taken away by two friends to have his injuries dressed.

"Was Fieldhouse quarrelsome?" asked the Crown.

"I would not say that, but he was rather fresh when he had drunk in him," McCarthy told about Fieldhouse running down Bay street, after the first scuffle was over, following the man who had run up Barton and down Bay street with the club. The murdered man stood in the middle of the road with his coat off, challenging some one to fight. McCarthy turned around to see where the rest of his friends were, when, before he knew what had happened, there was a rush and he lost track of what followed. The last he saw of Fieldhouse was on Barton street, when his friends were taking him (McCarthy) over to Hess street.

Examined by Mr. Kerr, McCarthy said he would not be positive that one of the two men had not walked over from the east side first, and got knocked down while the second one was crossing the road.

Mrs. Scott, who at the time of the fight resided on Bay street, near the Neelon house, said the man in the middle of the road with his coat off was struck running down the street, and apparently calling for police. Mrs. Scott stuck to the story she told at the inquest about scenes being thrown.

Mrs. Neelon, mother of one of the prisoners, was the next witness. Mr. Washington questioned her about the prisoners being in the fight, but she was very reluctant to say anything.

"The last question you answered at the inquest and included in the statement which you attached your signature to was that Connors, Neelon and Davis went across the road and were in the fight," said Mr. Washington.

"They were there," she answered, "but I could not say they were in the fight," "You have sworn to it at the inquest,"
