4 candle power incandescent lamp, per month 4c
8 candle power incandescent lamp, per month 7c
16 candle power incandescent lamp, per month 10c
32 candle power incandescent lamp 20c
4 ampere arc lamp, per month 80c
6 1/2 ampere arc lamp, per month 1.00
Nernst lamp, per glowler per month 20c
All lighting that is not strictly residential will class as commercial.
