Were the physical laws strictly observed from generation to generation, there would be an end to the frightful diseases that cut life short, and a long list of maladies that make life a torment or trial. It is the opinion of those who best understand the physical system, that this wonderful machine, the body, this goodly temple, would gradually decay, and men would die, as if falling asleep."

ENGLAND.
An eminent London financier, who has recently returned from a tour through France, has been heard to declare, "I never saw a country more prosperous—I never saw a people more contented." Another has an interview of nearly two hours with the Prince President, and he is fully impressed with the opinion, that Louis Napoleon firmly believes he may make France and himself greater and more powerful, by developing her internal resources, repairing her finances, and improving her fiscal system, than she and Napoleon the First were by war. A reduction of the army by 150,000 men is, doubtless, a good expedient, a good tendency. The establishment of a great warehousing company, to initiate the introduction of the bonding system, has also been proposed by the President to English capitalists, as a means of disposing with the cotton system, and of making Paris a great railway entrepot for the continent of Europe.

SCARCITY OF SILVER IN ENGLAND.—There is great complaint of an increasing scarcity of silver change in England, although the mint had issued small silver to the extent of £100,000 since 1st of July last. The Queen had issued a proclamation declaring that silver shall not be a legal tender in the colonies for payment of sums exceeding 40s. Silver coin had hitherto been used in many of the colonies for large payments. This proclamation was doubtless intended to prevent the large export of silver coin to Australia.

SCARCITY OF CANADIAN TIMBER.—We have heard it stated by several who are interested in the trade, that the scarcity of Canadian timber, especially for building purposes, is already beginning to be felt by a considerable increase in price. This is ascribed to the circumstance of so many vessels being diverted from the staple traffic of the St. Lawrence in order to convey emigrants to Australia and the States; and as the weather may now shut up the chance of further supplies for some time, it is feared that those who have entered into large building contracts when timber was at a low price, will now suffer much loss and embarrassment by its increased value in the market. —*Liverpool Advertiser.*

CONSUMPTION OF TEA.—It appears from a parliamentary paper, just printed, that there has been an increase in the consumption of tea. In the month ended the 10th ult., the quantity entered for home consumption was 5,496,224lb., against 5,322,656lb. in the like month of 1851.

INCREASED SUPPLY OF OPIUM.—From an official paper, it appears that in the month ended the 10th October, the importation of opium was 23,862lb.; whereas in the like period of the previous year it was 14,340lb. The quantity entered for home consumption in the last month was 7,073lb., against 5,267lb. in the same period of 1851.

An old male, the property of the Earl of Elinmore, believed to be between ninety and a hundred years old, has, after working almost a century, been at length "turned out to grass" upon the moor at Worsley, and is described by those who have seen it to be "as lively as a cricket."

In April next, Lord Falkland's term of Government at Bombay will expire; speculation is already rife as to his successor; the names of Sir George Clerk, Sir George Anderson, Sir James Hogg, Lord Elin, and Sir Charles Wodehouse have been mentioned as candidates; but the *Dublin University Magazine* has an article, written during the lifetime of the Duke of Wellington, entitled "Heroes—ancient and modern." The following extract may be altogether inopportune:—

"For him alone (the Duke of Wellington) fortune has checked her wheel and become stationary. We have found a parallel for some of his deeds, but none for his enduring prosperity. Cæsar has passed into a proverb; Alexander was cut short in an unequalled career; Constantine was killed in the Capitol; Coriolanus was banished; Minus escaped from a dungeon; Scipio was driven into private life; Epaminondas, Gustavus and Nelson died in the moment of their great victories; Hannibal was compelled to suicide; Belshazzar became a beggar; Sardanapalus, a powerful favourite, a strangled without an interposing hand; Buckingham perished under the knife of an assassin; Wolsey and Marlborough were disgraced; Charles XII fell doubtfully before an obscure fortress; and Napoleon died a broken hearted old man on the ruins of St. Helena. The star of Wellington has been all laurels, and has never paled. It 'sets unclouded in the gulph of fate,' an exception, an example, and a moral."

WORTHY OF IMITATION.—The following story, which is alike remarkable for its novelty and creditable to human nature, has been for some time past a pleasing topic for conversation on "Change."—A few years ago a merchant in this town unfortunately became bankrupt, owing to his creditors about £10,000. He re-commenced business, and in five months, by fortunate dealings in iron, he realized a profit of £40,000. As soon as this gratifying circumstance was a fact accomplished, he sent a circular to his creditors, offering to pay them the whole of the £10,000 in full with interest up to the present time. —*Liverpool Times.*

GOVERNMENT PROSECUTION.—THE SIXMILE-BRIDGE AFFAIR.—The Government have taken a very decided course in reference to the proceedings connected with the fatal affair at Sixmile-bridge, during the late contest election for the county of Clontarf. The Attorney-General has called for the intervention of the Court of Queen's Bench, to quash the indictment held at Sixmile-bridge, which resulted in a verdict of wilful murder against Mr. Delmege, a magistrate of the county of Clontarf, and several of the soldiers of the 31st Regiment, and the inquiry held subsequently in Limerick, at which a verdict of manslaughter was returned against some of the military party, who it was alleged, had fired the fatal shots. The learned gentleman called upon the Court to exercise summary jurisdiction forthwith, by quashing the indictments, but the judges were of opinion, that a conditional order should issue in the first instance, in order that notice might be served upon the agents of the next of kin of the persons shot at Sixmile-bridge, and accordingly Saturday next will be the hearing of the case. In the case of the prosecution instituted by the Crown against Mr. Zacharia Wallace, proprietor of the *Anglo Celt*, a newspaper published in the town of Carven, for a libel on the officers and men of the 31st Regiment, connected with the affair at Sixmile-bridge, a bill of indictment was sent on Tuesday before the City of Dublin term grand jury, by whom a true bill was found. The defendant is to take his trial at the sittings after the present term.

FRANCE.
EXTRAORDINARY ACCIDENT.—A very extraordinary accident occurred a week ago on board a Swedish steamer the *Lamart*, as it was proceeding from Stockholm to Ystad. In the night a violent storm arose, and a large vessel containing sulphuric acid, placed on the deck, was broken. A portion of the corrosive liquid passed through the crevices of the planks, and fell on to a bed in the cabin beneath. In this cabin the Count Eric Christian de Pontin, Chamberlain to the King of Sweden and Norway, was sleeping. The acid soon burnt through two blankets and reached the abdomen of the unfortunate gentleman, burning it dreadfully. The gas which escaped made it impossible for him to cry for help, and he became senseless. The next morning his servant, on going into the cabin, found that he had the lower part of his bowels eaten away. The unfortunate gentleman was unable to speak a word. The steamer was immediately put back to the port of Colmar, and the Count was conveyed to the hospital. Every possible attention was paid to him, but he expired after some hours of horrid suffering. He was only 28 years of age. —*Colmar's Messenger.*

ANOTHER FRENCH ATTEMPT AT AERIAL NAVIGATION.—Another attempt at aerial navigation was made recently in Paris. A Mr. Giffard constructed a balloon, of an oblong cylindrical form, about 120 feet in length, and 20 feet in diameter in the middle, but smaller towards the ends. At about 20 feet from the balloon was a sort of horse power. This steam engine was placed on a sort of platform, and was made to work a triangular sail placed at one end of the vessel, and a sort of rudder at the other end. The balloon on rising drove before the wind, but the aeronaut, by means of the rudder and the sails, was able to turn on one side, and even made a circular movement. This given him hopes that he will eventually succeed in navigating the air by means of his machinery, and the spectators were thus unfavourably disposed to him, admitted that the thing appeared not to be impossible. The perseverance with which the French are labouring to solve the great aerial problem certainly deserves notice.

AMBITIOUS DESIRES OF NATIONS.—England is now seeking to annex Borneo; Russia, the Moldavian provinces; France, more of northern Africa; the United States, either Cuba or the northern part of Mexico; and Prussia, a slice from Switzerland. Men, worth millions, do not hesitate to cheer their lion-black out of a diapason. Why should nations, governed by men, neglect the acquisition of more territory?

ARMY MOVEMENTS.—This being the customary period for effecting the relief of regiments serving in the Mediterranean, arrangements have been made to send the service companies of the 31st and 57th Regts. from Ireland to Corfu, to replace the 41st and 47th which proceed to Malta, to replace the 7th which proceeds to Nova Scotia, to replace the 9th which is to return home. The 48th and the 71st Regts. proceed to Corfu to replace the 40th and 92nd, which proceed to Gibraltar to replace the 44th, which proceeds to Canada, as so to bring the 25th home. The 2nd battalion 1st foot proceeds from Cork to the Ionian Islands, to replace the 30th, which proceeds to Gibraltar, to replace the 30th which proceeds to the West Indies, to replace the 34th, which proceeds to Nova Scotia, to replace the 42nd, to come home. The 85th proceeds to Mauritius to replace the 2nd, battalion 15th both sent from thence to the Cape of Good Hope. —*United Service Gazette.*

A RELIC OF THE PAST.—The aged and venerable bark *Maria*, of this port, which has been for some time undergoing repairs, was hoisted up on the Fairhaven Railway, on Wednesday. For the last fifty or sixty years, she has been successfully engaged in the sperm whale fishery, having been within the Gulf of Mexico, and in the Cape of Good Hope, and being now in possession of the Redman family. It is undoubtedly true, that the *Maria* was either the first or second vessel that displayed the American flag in the British Channel. Notwithstanding her great age, it is yet thought, that she will continue to be a useful member of the fleet for at least another year. Her model is very singular and different from that of an vessel at the present time. —*New Bedford Standard.*

An official list of the lost and damaged vessels on the Lakes between the 7th and 21st of November, presents the following summary: Schooners, 10; sloops, 1; brig, 3; all either wrecked, seriously damaged or compelled to suffer loss by throwing overboard portions of their cargoes. Twenty-one lives are reported lost.

A physician of New York asserts, that a thousand pounds of opium are retailed in this city every week, and that the terrible demoralizing and destructive practice of opium eating is fearfully increasing.

CHOLERA IN NASSAU, N. P.—Extract from a private letter, from Nassau, N. P., dated October 16:—I regret to say, that the cholera has been in the midst of us for three weeks past, and that hundreds are falling on the right hand and on the left. We have had a storm the last fifty hours, which seems to have increased the number of cases now. Not less than from fifteen to twenty per cent. in our small population fall victims to this dreadful malady.

A farmer in Canton, U. S., has a cranberry meadow of twelve acres in extent, lying near Punkapog Pond, from which he has raised, of the present season, over 100 bushels of fine cranberries, for which he has realized \$3000 in cash.

WEST INDIES.
BARBADOS, Oct. 22.—Fever is on the increase, and the mortality of the disease is greater than in the majority of cases; the skill of the faculty; besides which, there is much sickness prevailing in all the islands which, in most instances, is terminating fatally. The weather is sultry, with but few showers to allay the heat. The population of the islands of Martinique and Guadeloupe has been awfully thinned.

WHENEVER to the self-gratulations of the organ of the Administration, as to the increased prosperity of the Colony; the consequence, doubtless, of the adoption of Responsible Government—a reply is vouchsafed, showing the improvement to have its rise in other sources; or when, having from certain data adopted certain conclusions as to the balance of trade being £30,000 and upwards in favour of the Colony—the result of the cleverness and foresight of the men in office—the same date, that the contrary is the case, the cry is immediately raised, that they wish to degrade the Island—stop! what are the words! Here they are,—we put them in italics, for the sake of attracting attention:—"It would seem to be their (that is, the *Islander and Haszard's Gazette's*) desire,—though the thing may appear to be incredible,—(we think so, indeed)—for every reference in the Colony, but their own, to go to the dogs; for trade to be at a stand-still,—shops to be closed,—the labourer and the mechanic to be lingering about in idleness,—public credit to have vanished, and an enormous public debt to remain unrepaid. Then might the executive power be assumed successfully, and all the misfortunes of the times laid to its charge." Precisely! what a pity a sentence so sublime—or intended so to be (as the Lawyers say)—should be deficient in grammar; and we would recommend the reading of "that," in place of *for*, and "should" in place of *to*. It would be a pity that a sentence so highly drawn—so exquisite a piece of the language of the House of Assembly—should be so marred by even the slightest blunder. We trust, however, that not only posterity, but that our contemporaries will see, that the writer either forgot himself (as the saying is), or that it was written in a state of somnambulism;—such things have been—the party at the time imagining that he was composing a speech for the House of Assembly: it is just the species of bombastic trash that succeeds best on that side of the House of which the *Gazette* is the organ—what a loud cry of "hear!" would have accompanied the peroration. It may seem strange to some of our readers, that we condescend to take notice of assertions so groundless, and so contrary to truth that they carry their own refutation with them; but we beg to remind them, that as the shepherd's boy in the fable kept crying "wolf!" needlessly, till he was not believed, when the wolf came in earnest; so the converse of the case may happen, if we suffer the cry to go abroad, that we are trying to ruin the Island, without showing the falsity of the accusation,—the silly tale which is told, and not listen to us when we would wish to be heard. Besides, we wish to show, that the whole defence of the Government is based on fraudulent misrepresentation; we admit that much of it is the result of ignorance; the intention, however, is the same. We had stated, that the increase of the revenue of 1852 was in a great measure owing to the increase of taxation. Now what is the answer? "We can very easily show, that the 'present administration,' so far from having increased the public taxes, have materially lessened them; and that their Tariff is a much more liberal one, and therefore more conducive to the public prosperity, than that of their predecessors in office." Now who, in the first place, were the predecessors in office? "The 'present Administration'—and what had they to do with the taxation of the Colony? In the year 1849, there was no administration; it was the peculiar grievance that was then complained of,—that there was no set of men who should prescribe to the Assembly what they were to do, and what laws were to be made; that they were to be in office should hold seats in the Assembly, &c. In 1849, the people of Prince Edward Island were, in the matter of taxation and appropriation, responsible to themselves, and to themselves only. The members of the Executive Council, if they are not to do with it, then we have at least at this present moment. We are not going to defend that state of things; but we will not suffer the public to be deceived by false statements. We made the assertion, and we are prepared to prove it, and from their own showing. In the same *Gazette* is the following:—

Now, leaving 1849 out of the question, and compare 1851 with 1852, the first thing that meets us, is a halpenny per gallon on molasses. Why was this! A penny per lb. on unmanufactured tobacco; a halpenny on unmanufactured, and a penny on manufactured tobacco. There is still the duty on American flour. Add the increased light and harbour duties—peculiar to, and the disgrace of the present Administration,—and the increased duty on spirits—though last, not least,—and we have the secret of the increased revenue, coupled with the increase of the importations—the result of good seasons, and events over which the Government has no control. No; we have ever been, and always will be anxious for the welfare of the Colony; and we rejoice to see, that the inherent energy of the Island is bearing it on steadily and successfully, in the teeth of the mal-administration of its government. The state of the metropolis of a country so peculiarly constituted as is the Island, will suffice about any proof of its prosperity, or the reverse. And it is with pride that we look on the improved state of the stores, the cheapness and the great variety of articles now exposed for sale;—may we halt the plate glass windows as evidence of the Colony having got over the state of infamy which, in common with all the old northern Colonies of America, it was necessary to surmount, before any thing vigorous could be attempted. It is true, that this period has been with us more protracted than with our neighbours; and when we get a set of men into the Administration who have not and will not pledge themselves to become Responsible Government proprietors, we shall soon remove, or at least greatly reduce the principal obstacle to the full development of the resources of our fertile little Island. There is nothing, however, upon which we look with as great interest, as the promotion of learning and the desire for knowledge that have been so much augmented of late. Ship News.

ANTHROPOLOGICAL.—The Brig *Notia*, Captain Dakin, of Digby, from Pictou for Pembroke, Nova Scotia, with a cargo of coal, was lost in the gale of the 24th, on the north side of Pictou Bay, having previously struck on Cape Jack Ledges; (crew saved—vessel total wreck—cargo much damaged—sale of vessel, materials and cargo 3d proximo). Too much praise cannot be awarded Mr. Elisha W. Randall, of Little River, for his daring intrepidity and perseverance in saving the crew. The vessel struck about 5 o'clock, at night, on a reef some 50 or 60 fathoms to the westward of the island, and the crew remained all that terrible night, and the following day until 3 o'clock, p. m., on her decks, exposed to the tremendous sea, and a pitiless storm of rain and snow—having lost their boats and anchors on the ledge at Cape Jack. No violent was the sea and surf on the shore, that no boat dare put out; but Mr. Randall, convinced that the crew must perish during that stormy night, resolved, with three or four resolute young men, at the imminent risk of their own lives, to go to the assistance of the crew. They put out in a boat, which was almost immediately upended, and a hole stove in her bottom. Nothing daunted, Mr. Randall pitched up the boat with old canvas that had floated ashore, and a board nailed over it, and put off again. More fortunate this time, he succeeded in catching a line floated from the wreck by a keg—and finding it impossible either to approach the wreck or to draw the men ashore through the rocks and surf, he lay, by the force of his own, about 150 fathoms to windward of the vessel—while each of the crew (10 in number) successively attaching the line to his body, watched a favorable moment, when the wave reached, leaped overboard, and was drawn into the boat, in a state of exhaustion, and laid in the bottom. The captain remained until all the rest were rescued, and was then, in like manner, drawn into the boat. Such acts of courage and humanity should be noticed, and richly rewarded.—*Mr. Sun.*
