MONCTON'S NEW SCHOOL

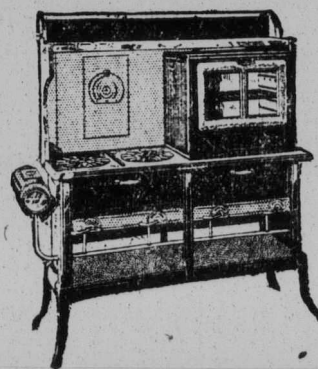
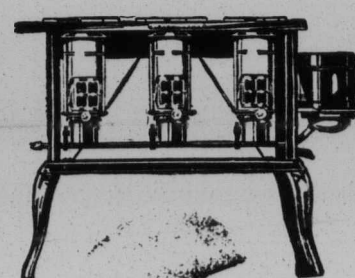
The plans for a new school building for the City of Moncton, drawn by F. Neil Brodie, of this city, have been accepted, and the contract for the work will be let immediately.
