
THE MAKING

There was nothing ambiguous about the will, nothing which could give the cleverest lawyer on earth the slightest chance of having it interpreted so that any person but the widow could benefit by it. So it is with the wills of the many great men. The will of the late Chief Justice White of the United States was not much longer. This is what it said: "This is my Thomas A. Edison last will. I give, bequeath and devise to my wife, Leita M. White in complete and perfect ownership all my rights and property of every kind and nature, whether real, personal or mixed, wherever situated, tate without bond and giving her thereof." A remarkably document and one over which it would be difficult enough to bring any action designed to alter its provisions. It is not unlike the will of the late E.H. Harriman filed in 1909, which was so brief, yet so indisputable, that it was regarded as a model. In addition to the attestations it ran: "I Edward H. Harriman, of Arden, in the State of New York, do make, publish and declare this as and for my last will and testament, that is to say: I give, devise and bequeath all my property, real and personal. of every kind and nature to my wife, Mary W. Harriman, to be hers absolutely and forever, and I do hereby nominate and appoint the

In connection with the administra tion of bird and game preserves under the biological survey, the acts on reservations have been for bidden by the secretary of agriculture, under date of May 4: Entering any game inclosue without permis sion; carrying firearms without per mission; permitting dogs to run at large; setting fires, cutting, damaging of removing timber or trees; allowing domestic animals to enter without per-mission; and injuring or destroying signs, fences or other property of the United States.






