An Imperial Guards Regiment to Keep Alive Tradition in British Military Life.

London, May 13.—The Times in a leader says: "It is unthinkable that no single army should be left wherein the spirit of the mighty Imperial army, which displayed to an astounded world the real power of the British Empire, may survive. There must be some Imperial unit of the army, if only to keep alive the Dominion tradition in British military life." Therefore it suggests the established of a regiment of Imperial Guards, with its home in Britain but commanded, officered and manned by the Dominions. The regiment might comprise two battalions. one composed of Canadians, South Africans and Newfoundlanders, and the other of Anzacs. The Times says this is only a tentative suggestion and it leaves India out on this account. It is thus plainly open to criticism and revisions, but could easily be nodified if necessary:
