I wish to bring under the notice of the Council the subject security taken for school momes, I believe that heretofore no bonds have ever been taken from Sub-Treasurers by the County Council. By a referrence to the 4th Clause of the 27th Section of the School Act, you will see that it is the duty of the Zvin Section Council to take proper security from all officers to whom school moneys may be entausted, it may be urged that a Township Trea-surer's bond to the Local Council, applies to all money passing through his hands, but care if or orbits to debtfold it money passing through his hands, but even if so (which is doubtful) it would af protection to parties who might suffer from the misconduct of a Treasurer, viz., to Trustees or Teacher, we will sup pose the case of a Township Treasurer who receives an order to pay a portion of School'money to a Union School in another Townhip, but he takes it in his head that it is not right to let any money leave his own township, and the local Council connives at or open-ly approves of his disobedience, where is the Security of Teach-er or Trustees? The Township Council may have bonds but they er or Trustees! The Township Council may have bonds but they are not obliged to prosecute. Township Councils are not the proper parties to take security for school money. There is another question connected with this subject, do Sub-Treasurers require re-appointment every year, or do they require to take an oath as County officers. The County Treasurer might be directed to take bonds to his satisfaction before delivering the Govennent money to the Sub-Treasurers, this might be done by mail without much trouble. I trust you will give the subject pro-ner attention, and that the longeney, havefore activities will be per attention, and that the looseness, heretofore existing, will be longer tolerated.
