

THE GOSSIP OF A WEEK.

A CHATTY LETTER ON INTERESTING CURRENT EVENTS.

Some Fearful Storms Several People Killed—The Prison Reform Inquiry—A Bold Bad Man from Berlin—Other Gossip.

Toronto, July 14.—Fearful storms last week throughout the Eastern States and part of Ontario did an enormous amount of damage. Fields of hay and grain were flattened as if a heavy iron roller had passed over them. Trees were uprooted in every direction and fences were levelled right and left. Baras innumerable unroofed and wrecked and sad to relate several lives lost. Last week the Prison Reform Inquiry was opened at Hamilton. The commission consists of J. W. Langmuir (chairman), Hon. Timothy Anglin (secretary), Hon. Charles Drury, Dr. A. M. Rosebrough, and A. F. Jury. The commission was appointed by the Ontario government in consequence of a resolution passed by the Prison Reform Conference held in Toronto last November requesting the selection of "a commission to investigate and report upon the question of prison reform with the view of suggesting improved methods of dealing with the criminal classes." The commission will hold sessions throughout Ontario.

The Montreal Herald are seemingly having a great deal of trouble on account of the strike of printers. The latter have been "out" now for several weeks. The Herald have managed to keep up appearances very well, despite the strike. The Printers Union have, it is alleged, been trying to buy up the few compositors the newspaper has been able to secure. In consequence three men have been arrested, including the President of the Union. Twelve of the ex-printers have also had warrants served on them. They are charged with leaving the Herald without proper notice.

A very strange murder has just occurred near Brighton in Northumberland County. A blacksmith named Minor was working away quietly in his shop when Charles Gerasin, a neighbor rushed in exclaiming "I'll show them, I've had too many of these things." He seized an oak club some three inches thick, and as another man called Robert Lockhart entered the door he followed him with a terrific blow. He then in a very cold and unfeeling way exclaimed "I've done the job. You can bury him. I've killed him and I will kill another." The strange part of the affair is that it is not known what reason the murderer was committed. The 30th Anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne was celebrated in truly grand style in Toronto. A procession, gorgeous and glittering composed of between four and five thousand men marched through the principal streets of the city. The pageant took one hour and four minutes to pass a given point. Bands, banners, brilliantly uniformed men, and highly decorated carriages and horses together with the immense size of the procession made many people say that it eclipsed in every respect any similar thing attempted during the late lamented Summer Carnival. Orangeism from the whole of the surrounding country were present and the tremendous were eminently fitting the 30th anniversary.

Stanley's Wedding. The Event Was Consummated on Saturday Last. London, July 14.—Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer was married on Saturday to Miss Dorothy Tennant in Westminster Abbey. The ceremony, a very brilliant one, was witnessed by most of the notable people, including royalty in England. Stanley has not recovered from his illness and was very weak throughout the affair. His best man was Count D'Arche, representing the King of the Belgians. The wedding breakfast was very largely attended. Mr. Gladstone, Lord Wolsley, Sir William Vernon-Harcourt, Sir John Mills, John Morley and other notables made speeches.

The ceremony was performed by the Dean of Westminster, the archdeacon of Westminster, and the lord bishop of Ripon. The service was full of choral. A great crowd congregated about the abbey and loudly cheered Mr. Stanley and Miss Tennant. Miss Tennant's dress was of white corded silk, trimmed with white satin and embroidered with pearls and orange sprays. She wore a miniature of the Queen, which had been presented by her majesty as a wedding gift. All the officers of Stanley's last expedition into Africa were present at the wedding. Stanley, who reached the abbey first, rose upon the entrance of Miss Tennant, and the ceremony at once began. During the ceremony he held beneath his arm the stick which he was compelled to use for support while walking. As he repeated the service his voice was almost inaudible, showing the result of his illness. Miss Tennant's voice was clear and steady, and only faltered as she repeated the words "in sickness and in health."

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THE DOMINION IN BRIEF.

Governor Royal has gone to Ottawa.

A statue is to be erected to the late engineer Page. Three prominent ladies in Ottawa are to become nuns. The New Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia has been sworn in.

Town Treasurer Barillier of Windsor is dead of pleurisy, aged 68. A lad named Kimpton was drowned in the canal at St. Catharines. The first merchant steamer from England has arrived at Vancouver.

An English girl has been brutally outraged by cavalry men in Quebec. Electric motors are being supplied the street cars in St. John, N. B.

An extensive gambling raid has been made by the police at St. Catharines. Dr. W. T. O'Reilly, Inspector of Asylums, died of paralysis at Kingston.

Two hundred Icelanders have arrived to take up their quarters in south Manitoba. A little girl in Montreal was fatally burned as a consequence of playing with matches.

The Bank of Montreal has ordered \$500,000 gold in New York for shipment to Europe. Mr. Patrick Haggerty the old gentleman injured at the Grand Trunk station is dead.

Baggage-master Galt, of the C. P. R., at Chatham, Ont., has been lost in the woods. Halifax and Bermuda newspapers have exchanged congratulations on the new cable.

Col. Elijah Ketcheson, 95 years old, who saw service in 1812 and 1837, died at Belleville. A million and a half will be spent by the Government by improving Montreal harbor.

An old miner expresses the opinion that the missing Earl of Shannon is in the Yukon country. The corner stone of the new High School at Montreal has been laid with Masonic ceremonies.

The cavalry officers in camp at St. John, N. B., declare their loyalty resolutions to be justifiable. Mrs. Hugh Morrow, of Bracebridge, Ont., has disappeared and is supposed to have succumbed by drowning.

Mr. Van Horne says he sees development and improvement over everywhere he has travelled in Canada. A youth named Hannaford has been crushed to death at Hamilton by slipping under a railway car in motion.

The kidnapping of Senator Pelletier during the recent elections in Quebec is being inquired into by Judge Murray. Mr. R. T. Walker, Q. C. Masonic Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada has arrived home from England.

A body, badly decomposed, with a fractured skull, has been discovered at Brockville. Murder is suspected. \$70,000 worth of locomotives have been sold to the railways within the last few days from the works at Kingston.

The Montreal assessors have nearly completed the census, and it is estimated that the population of the city and suburbs is 377,700. Mr. McFarlane, chief Government analyst at Ottawa, was severely scalded by a quantity of boiling alcohol being poured on his left arm.

Kingston merchants propose to form an insurance company if the Underwriters' Association does not immediately place their city in class A. The new organ for Notre Dame, Montreal, one of the largest on the continent, will be sent about the end of this month. It will cost \$50,000.

Dominion Government engineers are examining St. Andrew's Rapids, in the Red River below Winnipeg, with a view to putting in a lock and dam. A 2-year-old son of Mr. T. C. Beattie, of Bond Mills, London, fell into a pot of hot oil cake porridge and had his arm badly scalded the other day.

William Thomas Humphrey, 13-years-old, of Toronto, was drowned in the Don. Another lad was in bathing with him at the time. They recovered the body. The Searchers five brigades will use the Toronto Carriall Committee for \$125, the amount of a prize which they claim should have been awarded to them.

The United States Senate have confirmed the following nominations: Consuls—W. F. Holloway, of Indiana, at Stratford, Ont.; C. D. Joly, at Windsor, Ont. Sir Thomas Galt will act as Administrator of the Government of Ontario, during Sir Alexander Campbell's absence in Europe. The latter leaves on the 16th.

The revenue of Canada during the financial year ending the 30th ult., amounted to \$38,343,000 and the expenditure to \$30,939,000 leaving a surplus of nearly \$8,000,000. At Dartmouth, N. S., a crowd of people were thrown into the water by the sinking of a ferry boat. Four bodies were recovered, and it is not known how many more are left in the water.

John M. Williams, arrested on suspicion of stealing a value full of watches, was discharged by the St. Louis police at St. Louis, Mo., having been unable to secure any evidence against him. A suspicion that a Kingston lady, who died fifteen months ago, had been poisoned caused the authorities to have the body examined. Decomposition was so far advanced, however, that investigation was impossible.

The Dominion Government has decided to grant a petition of right to the Quebec corporation to sue for damages arising from the land slide last fall. A similar favor will be granted the owners of the properties destroyed and other private parties who have suffered thereby.

While John Stark, aged about 60 years, of the 7th concession, Chatham township, was driving a horse rake the horses became frightened and ran away. Stark was thrown forward between the animals, trampled upon and dragged along the ground for a considerable distance, and was so injured that he died.

Mr. J. B. Lane, of North Dorchester, during the recent storm had two 8-year-old bellows (beef cattle) killed by lightning. The kitchen on the south side of the residence of Mr. Barnabas Langlier, of Dorchester, was lifted completely out of its position and carried forty feet by the force of the wind on the same day.

News comes from Bothwell of the sudden death of a man named McLaren, who was working at the new iron bridge on the town line between that place and Mossa. About noon he felt a peculiar sensation, but kept at work, and in the afternoon fell insensible. He was unmarried and had just arrived from Ireland.

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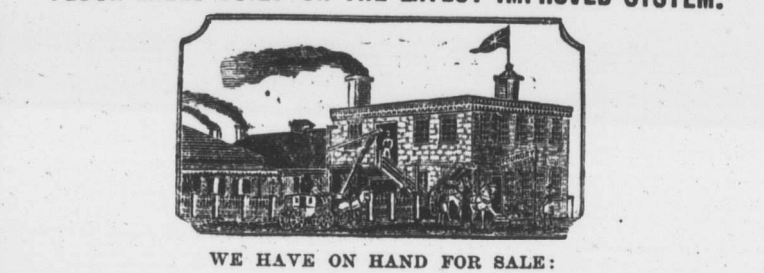
