Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The Government has been under the cross-fire in the matter of the proposed early extinction of the anti-dumping duties on Chinese goods. **L.O.A. at Channel.**

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—Royal William Lodge, No. 20, Loyal Orange Association, held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday evening, 4th inst. A goodly number of members were in attendance and the session was presided over by W. Bro. W. A. Morgan, Worshipful Master, assisted by Bro. Henry Brass, Deputy Master, and the regular official staff. Routine business was quickly disposed of as there were not any candidates for initiation. W. Bro. Rev. J. T. Beagrie, Chaplain of Lodge, on the invitation of the Worshipful Master, ascended the platform, and for the space of forty minutes lectured the meeting on the phases of the recent promulgation of the Papal Decree of "Ne Temere" and the effects it would have on the Protestants of the Province of Quebec. In calm, dispassionate language the lecturer traced the origin and intention of this decree and its probable consequences. At the conclusion of Rev. Beagrie's remarks, Bro. C. T. James spoke for a similar period, pointing out to the members their duty in the premises. An organized Protestantism the duty of the Orange Association was to protest against the enforcement of this decree in any British Possession. The decree itself was subversive of all ideas of British Justice, and contrary to the spirit of British law. The Courts of the British Provinces should never yield to such a pernicious Ecclesiastical pronouncement. The civil and religious status of the citizens was rendered nugatory if this decree was upheld by any British Court of Justice. Both speakers received acclamatory votes of thanks from the Lodge, (with honors) for their exceedingly explicit interpretations of the "Ne Temere" decree.

At the subsequent monthly meetings other addresses will be delivered on historical events in connection with the Empire, and Royal William Lodge has mapped out a programme which will be both instructive and entertaining for the balance of 1911. **Lansdowne's Plans.**

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 9. Lord Lansdowne, Leader of the Opposition in the House of Lords, introduced a bill for the reform of the Upper House, before a great audience, to-day. Unionists, he said, were convinced that an amendment to the constitution of the House of Lords should proceed simultaneously with the reform of the relations of the two Houses. There was a desire to demonstrate to the country they could provide an efficient second chamber which could be trusted to use its powers fairly between great political parties; to faithfully serve democracy and at the same time be strong enough to resist gusts of passion and prejudice with which all democracies were familiar. The proposed House would consist of 350 Lords of Parliament. No peer should hold his seat for more than twelve years, but would be eligible for re-election. The Peers themselves would elect 100 members possessing statutory qualifications such as present or former Viceroy, Governors, Privy Counsellors, members of the House of Commons, diplomats, naval and military officials, civil servants, lord mayors, provosts, etc. The 2nd contingent would consist of 120 members to be elected from outside the House of Lords by an Electoral College, composed of members of the Lower House, representing constituencies comprised of electoral districts into which the country would be divided by specially appointed commissioners. The third section of the House, numbering 100 members, would be appointed by the Crown, on recommendation of the Cabinet. Princes of Royal Blood would retain their seats, as also would the Archbishops, while five bishops would be elected, including the Lord Chancellor and ex-Chancellor, there would be sixteen law lords. The Bill also provides that Peers, who are Lords of Parliament, should be elected by the House of Commons. Lansdowne concluded by expressing the belief that there could be no permanent party majority in the House as re-constructed in the manner the bill proposes. The power of the Crown to appoint hereditary peers would be limited to 5 appointments each year. The Bill was read a first time. Viscount Morley who followed the Marquis of Lansdowne threw cold water on the plan. He admitted the author of the Bill had taken a bold, frank course and possibly a helpful course, but he said the Government should not accept the proposals as a solution of the difficulty.

**Items of Interest From Montreal.**

Montreal has been experiencing a very cold wave all this week. Up to Sunday last the weather was as warm as in any day in summer, there being a temperature of 70 deg. Fahr. Since then the winds have been big and cold and the sun has literally as well as figuratively hidden his face. One would imagine oneself in November. A meeting of the Newfoundland Society of this city will take place on Tuesday next at 7.45 p.m. The meeting will be held in the Society rooms on Lagache Street. St. Major Johnson will give a lecture illustrated with limelight views. The subject will be "Through Canada." On the morning of Thursday, the 27th ult., a very large fire occurred in an apartment house on Mount Royal Avenue was completely gutted by fire. No less than sixteen families were thrown homeless on the street in the early morning. Happily no lives were lost. The building was five storeys high with a basement. This fire has given rise to much discussion as to the condition of public buildings in regard to their being fireproof and built according to regulations. The building in question was not according to regulations, as it was a storey too high and its four walls only were fireproof. Chief Tremblay of the fire department has been ordered to inspect every apartment house in the city. The first conference between the City Board of Control and the Street Railway Committee was held on the 1st inst. Four companies have amalgamated to form one Street Railway Co. and this of course necessitates the drawing up of a new contract, which is the object of this conference.

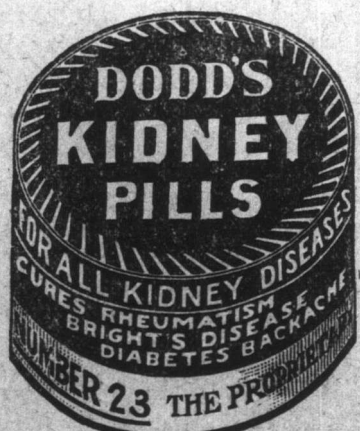

**Barry Retains Title.**

50,000 People Witness Race for English Sculling Championship. London, May 2.—Ernest Barry, England's champion sculler, retained his title yesterday in a match with Wm. Albany, of River Lea, defeating the latter in a well rowed race over a 4 1/2 mile course from Putney to Mortlake. Barry owed his victory to superior condition. He won the toss and chose the Surrey side of the river, which gave him a big advantage. Despite this, however, Albany was in the lead by two to three lengths to Hammer Smith, halfway point on course. Here Barry drew up on even terms, but Albany quickly resumed the lead. Challenger rowed himself



out within the next mile and Barry soon drew away, winning by five lengths. His time was 23 minutes and 2 seconds. More than 50,000 persons lined the course and much betting, with Barry heavy favorite, was indulged in. Weather was perfect but river was rough in spots.

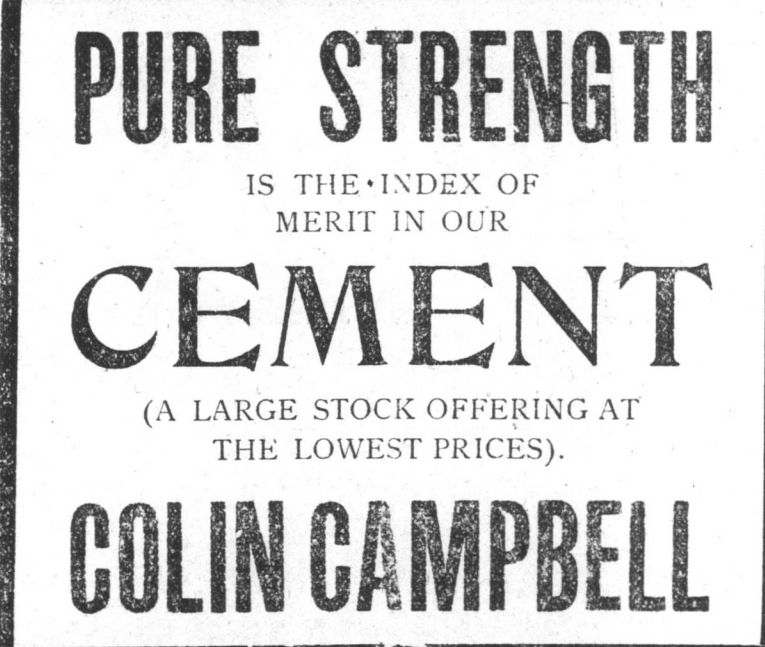
