Special to Evening Telegram.
ROME, To-Day.
Official despatches say: Early this morning the ships of the first Italian squadron entered the roadstead at Tobruk, where they found no Turkish warships. They summoned the garrison to surrender but the Turks replied with a flat refusal and hoisted the Turkish flag. The battleships Vittorio and Emanuele opened fire. The first shots carried away the flag and made a large break in the fort. Rear Admiral Aubrey landed several companies of marines, who after a short struggle overcame the resistance of the small Turkish force. The Italians occupied the fort and hoisted their flag.

A despatch from Brindisi says: Two Italian destroyers, Arigliere and Fuciliere, stopped the Austrian mail steamer near St. Jean de Madna. The commander, Bisceletti, went aboard the steamer, his boat carrying a white flag. On its return to the Arigliere the white flag was blown away and Turkish shells opened fire from the cliffs. The boat reached the Arigliere in safety, and the Italians returned the fire. The Turkish batteries, two encampments and the barracks were destroyed. A large number of Turks were killed and wounded.

Arctic Explorer Cannot be Found

A message received from Greenland says Knud Rasmussen, the Danish explorer, has failed to discover any traces of Captain Mikkelsen and his companions, who after having been rescued off the coast of East Greenland last year, left their party to search for traces of the lost explorer Ericson. Rasmussen expresses the fear that Mikkelsen and party perished.

Italy Hardens Terms of Peace.

LONDON, To-Day.
Most of the correspondents at Constantinople agree with Turkey renewing efforts to secure peace; but they differ as to the procedure which should be followed—whether by arbitration through a European Conference or by other means. According to reports from Rome, Italy, which at one time was ready to pay Turkey a large compensation, will pay nothing to Turkey, although she will not impose a war indemnity. If peace is concluded forthwith, if hostilities are prolonged, reports say Italy will insist upon a heavy indemnity.

Indian Moslems Appeal to Govt.

SUPREME COURT.

This morning the Court adjourned as a mark of respect to Mr. McNelly. The Chief Justice said: On Saturday this Court, took notice of the passing of Sir James Winter, K.C., the senior member and the acknowledged leader of the Bar. To-day it is our sad duty to express our sense of the loss which the legal profession has sustained in the death of Mr. McNelly, K.C. They were contemporaries professionally and in public life they for many years worked side by side. They, at an early age, had learned the best traditions of their profession and for more than a generation showed in practice at the Bar their high conception of their duty as advocates. It was recognized by all of us that to them the cause they represented was more than fees which it might bring to them. Indeed their sense of right and their love of justice outweighed all other considerations. They were both eminent in their profession and they leave a place that cannot be readily filled. The relations which existed generally between the Bench and the Bar have always been cordial. In their case this cordiality was marked in an eminent degree. Mr. McNelly was a man of versatile powers. His great abilities were displayed in many walks of life. His eloquence, his literary attainments, his culture, were well known and appreciated amongst us. He was an amiable personality and he will be truly mourned by a large circle of sincere friends. As a mark of respect to his memory the Court will now adjourn.



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At St. Thomas' Church Sermon on the Rosary

Tribute to the late Sir James Winter by the Bishop and Rector.

Yesterday morning, His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundland was the preacher at St. Thomas' Church, and took for his text, the words: "And the text shall fade: and the things that I have given them shall pass away from them." Jer. 31. 34. His Lordship likened life to the leaf which fades, and suggested illustrations evidenced in nature at this time of the year. During the course of his sermon, he made touching references to the late Sir James Winter, as a churchman, whose help was always given in any department of church life it was needed. During his episcopate of thirty-three years, he had abundant opportunities of witnessing the generosity of the help afforded by Sir James. It was safe to say that no adviser or helper had been more generous in his respect than the late Sir James Winter. At the close of the service, the Dead March was played by the organist while those present stood with bowed head in tribute to the memory of the deceased.

At night, the Rector, Rev. G. R. Golden, M.A., made reference to the loss which the parish had sustained by the demise of Sir James. For 32 years, he had represented the parish in the Diocesan Synod, and had also filled at various times all the important offices of the church; and was always willing to render cheerfully aid where his services were needed.

Yesterday afternoon the Rev. E. J. Peck, missionary in the Arctic regions, addressed a full house and told of his work among the Eskimos of Baffin's Land and elsewhere in the North. Bayley, B.A., will address the gathering.
