

## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 13. Two hundred dead were lying in the streets of Ixapa, last night, after De- toa's band of Zapatistas halted its march to Toluca, capital of the state in Mexico, 15 miles northward. The town was garrisoned by 100 rurales. Fighting occurred around Tenenico earlier in the day. Six hundred fed- erals quartered there defeated the rebels. The latter then concentrated their efforts on the smaller garrison of rurales at Ixapa. At the end of the fight, all the rurales were dead, the 200 including many of the townspeople. The rurales fought desperately. Toluca is now garrisoned by more than 500 federal soldiers, but reports from there say that the residents are panic-stricken, believing that a big battle is imminent.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. Cardinal Gibbons has been appealed to by Mr. Innes, the British charge d'affaires, to start a movement in this country towards sending Roman Cath- olic missionaries into the Putumayo Rubber district of Peru. A collection of funds for the purpose has been started in England. In spite of St. Roger Casement's report, Mr. Innes says that the cruelties have not been crushed. The State Department is considering the suggestion, but has not yet communicated with the Card- inal. The opinion expressed by a leading official of the Department is that it would be a good thing to col- laborate with the Putumayo Mission fund started in England.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 13. The Hague will have to acquiesce, it is generally agreed to-day, in Ger- many's demand for the control and im- position of river tolls. There is no way at present of digging a ship canal through German territory from Cologne to Menden, as the Kaiser threatens and it is admitted its effect would be the complete ruin of Rotter- dam.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 13. In view of the prevalence of ice in the North Atlantic, Steamship Com- panies which are parties to the track agreement decided to-day that it would be undesirable to revert to the north- ern track for west-bound steamers on August 15th, and East-bound steamers on August 24th, as had been plan- ned. There will be no change made in the routes before August 21st.

LONDON, Aug. 13. A declaration of war by Bulgaria against Turkey, was announced at a mass meeting attended by 20,000 peo- ple at Sofia to-day. According to a news despatch, politicians of all par- ties made speeches in support of the demands.

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CHICAGO, Aug. 13. "I expect to sign papers to-day or to-morrow that will close arrange- ments for a ten round bout with Jean- pette in New York," said Johnson, the champion heavyweight. "I have de- cided to fight this battle for the sake of my wife only."

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DOITMUND, Germany, Aug. 13. Twenty-six workmen were buried this morning by the fall of a slag bank at the Iron Works in the sub- urbs of this city. Eight bodies have been exhumed. It is believed that all the men have perished.

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CAIRO, Aug. 13. The trial of 3 youths arrested for being concerned in the plot to assass- inate Lord Kitchener, took place to- day; all were found guilty and sen- tenced to fifteen years hard labour.

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GIBRAITAR, Aug. 13. Mulid Hafid, ex-Sultan of Morocco, who yesterday definitely abdicated in favor of his brother, arrived here to- day with a large harem and suite, on his way to France.

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SALISBURY, England, Aug. 13. Fenwick, the airman, was killed to- day, while participating in the mili- tary aviation speed tests over Salis- bury Plains.

## Fishery West.

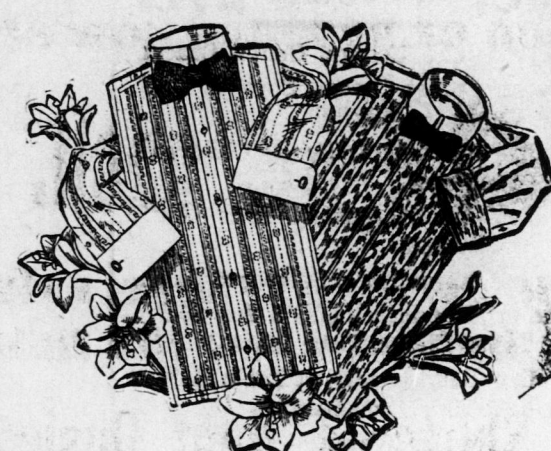

## Blame for Moral Decline.

IS LAID ON HOBBLE SKIRTS.

Censore Attribute Increase in Number of "Mashers" to Abbreviated Form of Dress—Time to Call a Halt.

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 6.—Wide- spread interest in this city was at- tracted yesterday by the statement of Rev. Dr. Walter T. Summer, chairman of the Chicago Vice Commission, that immodest dressing by women was re- sponsible for "mashers." Moral cen- sors of the city agreed with Dr. Sum- mer and declared that a change in the styles was urgently needed here. They agreed with him that the nation was passing through an era of suggestive dressing.

The Rev. Dr. Amos D. Johnson, pas- tor of Sileam Methodist Episcopal Church, who has been active in moral movements in the city, advocated a conference the aim of which would be to wage an educational campaign to show women and girls the evils of the hobble skirt.

"I think that the Episcopal author- ity of Chicago has uttered the truth," said Dr. Johnson. Modesty stands in deadly peril because of the supposed striking attire now worn by women. It is time to call a halt. Pure minded youths are awayed by the brevity of skirts and I believe that the predom- inating styles are hideous.

"I am encouraged by the activities of the great papers of the country in condemning the hobble skirt and other forms of sensuous and abbreviated attire. Newspapers can do more good than other agencies, and I see only victory in sight when they enter into the crusade.

"I am inclined to believe that there are more 'mashers' than in past years. Naturally, you can only blame the immodest clothing."

Dr. Thomas C. Pollock, of the Oak Park United Presbyterian Church, de- clared the predominance of 'mashers' was a shame to the police forces of the larger cities. "But," he added, 'ministers and others shocked by the pageant of immod- est clothing should not censure the police. The root of the evil is the senseless desire of women to expose their charms as far as the laws per- mit. They have gone far enough, and moralists should step in.

## BOSTON'S PROTEST.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 6.—Boston clergymen agree with the Rev. Walter T. Summer of Chicago, that women's dress is responsible for the 'masher' evil. The Rev. J. Frank Chase, Sec- retary of the Watch and Ward Society, said:—

"There never was a time when women dressed in a manner to expose herself so much as now. The pre- vailing style of tight skirt and low corset leaves little to the imagination. This must necessarily have a de- moralizing influence and make the wearers of these clothes liable to in- suit."

"The women have taken their style of dress from Paris. It is small won- der that the men who see them be- lieve they have taken their style of morality from Paris alone."

The Rev. E. A. Torrey, of Dudley Street Baptist Church, said:—

"Women of the highest respectabil- ity dress, powder and paint them- selves to-day to look like demi-mo- nades, and so encourage men to be- lieve that they are such. Recently I was in Los Angeles, and I was horri- fied at the manner in which women there dressed and painted themselves. Only a few days ago a woman told me that just the same thing was true in New York."

The Rev. Dr. Robert C. MacArthur, of New York, who is filling the pulpit during the absence of the pastor of Tremont Temple, said:—

"There can be no question as to the suggestiveness of the prevailing fash- ion in women's clothes."

## STATEMENT FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 6.—Worm support of the statement of the Rev. Walter T. Summer, chairman of the Chicago Vice Commission, that women should revise their dress as a first step toward the 'anti-mashers' cam- paign is found in certain circles at the nation's capital.

"This is a serious problem," said Mrs. Currie, superintendent of the Florence Crittenden Home and Mission here, in commenting on the dress of some of the younger women of to-day. "It is one which every mother should think about."

"No one can deny that the clothes worn by many women and girls to- day are particularly bad. Some of the dresses worn by some of the young girls one sees in the street are positi- vely a disgrace."

Washington has begun an effective 'anti-mashers' campaign, and is push- ing it with vigor. Preachers from the pulpits frequently call attention to the extremes in dress seen on F street, which is the street for prome- nade in this city.

His pet follies, the railway and agricultural policies were his chief themes, but he forgot to explain the Coaker Memorials, Morison forgetting the law, the \$40,000 in the St. George's Lumber Co.; why second class passen- gers only are vaccinated at Port aux Basques, and why he turned down the petitions of the F. P. U. for an election the coming fall and many other mat- ters which would have been more in- teresting than two blades of grass, hills white with sheep, and linen fac- tories orations of other years. Chan-

nel is now to have when convenient, a new public building, a main line connecting road to Rose Blanche, and numberless other local improvements. Mr. Moulton did not display any of his eloquence, being willing to permit his leader to do his part of the speaking as well. At the conclusion of the meeting one half the audience had left the building before it occur- red to any of those on the platform that it is usual to close up proceed- ings by singing the National Anthem. Similar lapses occurred the last time the Premier spoke here. Was it a forget or intentional? Telegraph of- fices were working overtime last night getting off press and other reports of the great reception tendered Sir Ed- ward, when not a flag was flying in honor of his visit yesterday and even the elements conspired against him. 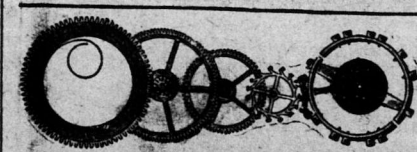
