#### Historical Society.

At last night's meeting of the Historical Society a most interesting paper on the Pilgrim Fathers was read by Mr. W. A. Munn. Details of the life of these early settlers, their dealings with the Indians, their customs, dress Eating too many Green Peas has and houses were told. The story of a given the Adelaide Street-Teronto Red Idnian who was the first these dauntless men heard speak Engesting. The Indian had been captured years before and sold as a slave in Malaga. From there he was smuggled on board a ship belonging to "Guys" colony and brought to Newfoundland. Guy sent him back to his native soil and his words to the Pilgrim Fathers on meeting them were, Englishmen.

A close connection between New

England and Newfoundland was made during the life time of the Pilgrim Fathers, and one of their ships visited Bay Bulls in 1655 to purchase cod-Indies and buying hogs, fowl, medicine and footwear. For some years the Collector of Customs at St. John's was a subordinate of the Collector at Boston. Mr. Munn in replying to a vote of thanks moved by Dr. Burke and seconded by Mr. H. F. Shortis, took occasion to recall other connections with the American colonies referring to such families as the Gills, the Hutchings. Bridges and Dunscombes, some of whose ancestors were born there.
