

CONFLICTING REPORTS OF THE BALKAN DISPUTE. ATHENS, Oct. 21.

(By Lord Islington, in Daily Mail.) Readers of Mr. Amery's recent speech at Birmingham might well infer from his remarks that the journals which have been steadfastly opposing his Mosul policy were actuated by ulterior and sordid motives and in no way represented public opinion. As Parliament does not reassemble intil late in November, it is important that this impression, if it exists, should forthwith be removed. It may be confidently affirmed that the great majority of people in this untry are desirous of seeing Great

The Press has come under Mr. Amery's censure for faithfully reflecting public opinion regarding future policy in Iraq. I cannot believe that the Prime Minister seriously contemplates a reversal of his deliberate onouncement of 1923, which indicated our withdrawal from Iraq not later than 1928. In making this pronouncement of policy, concurred in by the Iraq Government, the Prime Minister undoubtedly realized the strong public opinion in favour of withdrawal. He doubtless was further influenced by knowledge of the present and potential cost of continuing our esponsibilities in Iraq.

What may be said to-day for the Prime Minister's reasons for adhering to that policy? Surely they are doubly intensified? Great Britain is asked to shoulder a new scheme of responsibility, greater both in period and territory than the old one and fraught with infinitely greater embarrassment and danger.

In these circumstances I trust the Prime Minister will remove any doubt in the public mind regarding his attitude and that of his colleagues and will without further hesitation adhere to his previous pronouncement.
