Will of the Late Senator Leonard.

The will of the late Senator Leonard was
filed for probate Saturday. The total
value of the real and personal estate
is placed at \$291,788 43, of which
the personal amounts to about \$250,000 and
the real to \$38,000. To the widow he leaves
the household and the income of the bank
stocks during her life; after her death to be
the property of the two daughters. The
value of the bank stock cannot at present
be ascertained with exactness, but agree-
ment in round numbers \$50,000, while the
homestead is valued at \$60,000. All the
rest of the real and personal estate goes to
the sons, Frank and Charles, equally.
An executor he appoints his widow,
Mrs. Leonard, and the two sons,
Frank and Charles, and also nominates his
friend, Philip Mackenzie, to act as referee
in the circumstances of the case may require.
