The spokesman for the Sunday school assembled every Sunday afternoon. There was an increase of 39 in the average attendance, (exclusive of the pastor's Bible class), nearly one half of which was credited to the primary class. The attendance of Chinese had fallen off, owing to the removal of several from the city. The total mission collections were \$298 46; the school receipts \$504 37; the expenditure \$386 52; balance, \$117 85.
