THE WHEEL.

ARE CYCLES DOOMED? This is from the London Ironmonger:

A rather formidable competitor of the bicycle, I hear, has made its appearance in the Midlands in the shape of a pneumatic road-scooter. It has lately been seen in the streets of Birmingham, and, judging from the admiration it excites, is not unlikely, I should think, to find its way soon into all parts of the country. The invention, which was patented a short time ago by a Scotch firm, is evidently derived from the old roller skates of skating rink celebrity; but, whereas the ordinary roller skate has four wheels, the pneumatic skate has only two, placed in line at either extremity of the skate.

The wheels are rather larger than those of the roller skate, and instead of solid rubber, are covered with pneumatic tires. The patentees claim for them that one can skate over ordinary turnpike roads with them the same as on ice and at even greater speed, while at the same time they will easily ascend and descend hills. Six or seven miles an hour, however, is the maximum speed accepted in the streets of Birmingham, and that only on smooth roads. One obvious advantage of the pneumatic skate over the pneumatic cycle is that punctured tires may be easily replaced, as the skater may carry surplus tires, or even reserve wheels readily fitted, in his overcoat pocket.

The Aldermen Learn a Lesson in Advertising.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen Will Visit London.

Employees of the Port Stanley Railway Syndicate Asking for Their Wages.

No More Room in the Aged Men's Home—Col. Clark's Offer Dropped—Moses Cox Withdraws His Sewer Tender.

"Have any of the members of the council seen the trade edition of the Free Press, by which the city was to be advertised?" asked Ald. Searrow of his colleagues at the regular meeting of the council last night. The half-hour's talk that ensued was the liveliest that has been heard in the council chamber at any regular session this year. Even the chairman laughed, and many of the aldermen were at times in serious danger of an attack of apoplexy so hilarious they became.

"I received," Ald. Searrow went on to state, "a copy of an alleged trade edition on Saturday, and I would ask the mayor if it was the intention of this council to spend the money which they devoted to this class of work. Personally I think it is a disgrace to those who got it up, a disgrace to the office that published it, and a libel upon the gentlemen (meaning the aldermen) who are represented there. It is also a disgrace to the city at large, and more especially to merchants of the city who have agreed to give a certain amount towards it, expecting to get value for their outlay. I want to ask if that account has been paid."

The Mayor—It has not.

Mr. Searrow—That's all right. I would like to ask if you approve of the copy that was presented to you.

The Mayor—I received a copy at my door in the usual way. I have called in the cuts for fear they will be used in future criminal trials. (Laughter.)

Ald. Stevely—I have not seen a copy. I want to let you know that they have not been extensively circulated.

Ald. Garratt presented Mr. Stevely with a Buffalo Express in the proceeding which the council last year paid several hundreds of dollars and which now rest in peace in the basement of the hall.

Some one gave Mr. Stevely a copy of the Free Press "trade edition," the alderman remarking as he adjusted his glasses, "Well, I did not receive a copy, but I heard some people talking about it very unfavorably, saying that it was not a credit to the city or anybody else."

Ald. Fitchett—I want to know what we will do with them.

The Mayor—When the bill comes in we can do something then.

Ald. Parnell then moved, seconded by Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald, that the copies of the edition be delivered on board World's Fair trains at different stations.

Ald. Taylor—Would it not be well to have some of them placed in the Midway Pleasure? (Laughter.)

Ald. Thon, Jones—Or better still, to have them presented to the grocers and butchers of the city, to do up parcels with. I would not like to see them delivered on the trains.

Ald. Searrow—I am going to object to this council paying that money if I have not got an injunction to do it. I trust that the council will never pay that account until the Free Press give us 5,000 copies of a respectable published, or at least printed paper. Neither the work nor the paper is it in a state to be advertised in this town. I will move that these papers be not received by this council, and that the clerk inform the gentlemen who are in charge of it that this council refuse to accept the alleged "trade edition."

Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald—It is not creditable to spend the ratepayers' money and not get value for it.

Ald. Searrow asked Ald. Parnell if he approved of the edition.

Ald. Parnell—I don't want to say. The Mayor—He is moving that they be distributed on trains in order that they be got out of town. (Laughter.)

Ald. Searrow—move in amendment that the supposed "trade edition" received by the city clerk to-day be sent back to the publishers, and that the account be not paid, the edition not being what was promised.

Then the question as to what really was promised came up, and could not be answered. No promises were given.

Ald. Stevely then began a running commentary on the looks of the various aldermen as they appeared in the edition. His remarks were much provoking.

The mayor referred to Mr. Reid's advertisement as "a bull in a china shop, only you could not tell just where the bull came in."

Ald. Stevely's grandfather's clock was intended to represent his shop.

Ald. Cox said that it was not to be expected that a crowd of aldermen's mugs would come out any better.

Some further talk was indulged in, the aldermen coming to the conclusion that, there being no agreement, they would have to pay the grant. The vote on Mr. Parnell's motion to distribute stood:

Yeas—Mayor Essery, Ald. Cox, Stevely, James Fitzgerald, Fred J. Fitzgerald, Parnell, J. G. Fitzpatrick, J. W. Jones, Thon, Jones, M. Searrow, Joshua Garratt, Geo. Shaw—6.

So the papers will be delivered on the World's Fair trains.

Ald. Garratt and Searrow stood by the motion to send the copies back.

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S VISIT.

Before the general business was taken up the mayor stated that Mr. Houston, agent of the C. P. R., had telephoned to the effect that the Governor-General of Canada and Lady Aberdeen wished to meet the citizens of London on their return from Chicago on Monday next at 12:30 noon. On motion of Ald. Parnell the mayor and Ald. Meale made the necessary arrangements to meet them.

THE CAR SHOPS QUESTION.

Under the head of unfinished business Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald said: "The citizens generally don't seem to be very well informed as to the position of the car shops about the city. The opinion seems to be that the matter is resting or sleeping in the hands of the council. I am not in the position to give the information and I would like to ask the mayor to enlighten us."

The mayor said that the letter book and while it was being brought, he said: "I may as well explain that the agreement as arranged when the president was here, was that Mr. Searrow with a letter and there has been no reply. The letter was sent as follows:

"To Mr. Searrow, Esq.—I enclose agreement to car shops, revised to meet the last offer of your company. You will

observe that your company covenants to employ, on the average 500 men, and also that our corporation have the right to annul the agreement if less than 400 men be employed for over six months in any one year. Without these safeguards there is no use asking the electors to grant the \$100,000. If this arrangement will satisfy your company, let me know as soon as possible, in order that the vote can be taken at the municipal election. Yours truly,

"London, Oct. 2, 1893."

The mayor again stated that no reply had been yet received and the matter dropped.

Bylaw fixing the water rate of the McClary Manufacturing Company was read for the third time and became law.

Ald. Parnell asked the mayor just before adjournment whether any returns had been yet received from the M. C. R. The latter replied that there were none.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald read No. 3 committee's report, which was brief and as follows: Your committee recommends that the petition of Mrs. W. Taylor for a new electric light on the corner of Grey and Colborne streets be granted.

Mr. Fitzgerald moved that the clause pass. Several aldermen spoke of the necessity for the light.

Ald. Garratt then moved in amendment that the matter be laid over until the proposals for electric lighting were in.

Ald. Parnell seconded and advised the council to go slow. Each light cost \$50.

Ald. Thon, Jones said: "The mayor knows anything slower than electricity, as we have had it this year, I would like to see where he gets it."

Ald. Stevely asked that the motion pass. A light in the corner of the church and corner was necessary. No other church in the city was without a light. Ald. Cox spoke in a similar strain.

Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald said that once or twice before No. 3 ward had been granted a light for that corner, but the lights had always been placed in some other position. He wanted the matter referred back to the committee.

The amendment was lost, the motion carried and the light will be placed in position.

NUMBER TWO COMMITTEE.

Ald. Garratt (chairman) read the report as follows: 1. Recommending that no action be taken on memo from council re advertising connection of a tile drain on Oxford street from Wellington street to the river. 2. That the communication of Ritchie, Ludwig & Campbell, claim for damage for alleged accident to E. H. Plack, of St. Thomas, be filed. 3. That Moses Cox's tender to construct an 18-inch tile drain on English street between Dundas street and Carling's Creek for \$715, gullyholes \$19, and manholes \$15, be accepted, provided he agree to use Standard sewer pipe in said construction. 4. That the Board of Education be granted permission to put in at their expense necessary steam coils in School Inspector Carson's office and to make connections with the steam pipes of the city hall to supply heat to said office, provided that said connections can be made without interfering with the heating capacity of the other portions of the building. 5. With regard to clause 3 Mr. Kingdon read a letter from Mr. Cox in which he withdrew his tender. He had understood that he was to be allowed to use Hamilton tile instead of the standard tile that the committee insisted upon.

Ald. Garratt moved in amendment that Mr. Cox be relieved from his contract, and that the offer of the next lowest tender, Charles Harb, be accepted at \$1,030 05; manholes \$25 and gully holes \$15.

Clause 4 passed, and the report was adopted as amended.

NUMBER ONE COMMITTEE.

Ald. Parnell, in the absence of Ald. Meale, presented No. 1 committee's report. It recommended: 1. The payment of accounts amounting to \$4,039 35. 2. That a grant of \$50 be made to the Salvation Army Rescue Home. 3. That the petitions of Ann Connors, Bridget Moran and Sarah Jones be referred to the committee of the water commissioners, be filed for reference. 5. That the blanks in bylaw fixing rate of water for the McClary Manufacturing Company be filled in to read five cents per 100 feet, and that the company pay the regular meter rent, and if they desire to purchase their own meters they be allowed to do so under the direction of the water commissioners. 6. Your committee begs to report on the report from council requesting your committee to procure from Col. Clark amendments to his last amended proposition, that on account of the unsatisfactory condition of the said proposition no action be taken. 7. Your committee begs to submit the police court clerk's report for the month of September. 8. Your committee begs to report progress on memo from the council, re school moneys, Stevens & Burns, re local improvement rates, Parks & Parson, re workmen's wages L. and P. S. R. syndicate, and London Street Railway propositions.

Clauses 1, 2, 3 and 4 passed without debate. With regard to clause 5 Ald. Garratt asked that the water be granted at the rate mentioned as long as the city had it to spare. This line was added to the clause. Clause 6, 7 and 8 passed as read and the report was adopted.

C. Becker—Re street sweeping. No. 2.

Thos. H. Lumscombe—Calling attention to alleged unsatisfactory state of sewer on Tabbot street in front of Mrs. Nicholson's residence. No. 314. No. 2.

A. Walker—Asking permission to repair his barn lately damaged by fire. Granted.

Miss M. Searrow, on behalf of Loydville Circle, Companies of the Forest—For free use of East End Hall on night of Nov. 14. Mrs. Cripps spoke in support of the petition.

Ald. Garratt moved that the prayer of the petition be granted.

Ald. J. W. Jones rose to point of order. A previous motion had been passed by the council by which the current expenses had to be paid in all cases. In order to grant the request the motion would have to be restricted, and a notice of motion was required to do this.

Ald. Searrow asked that the Companies of the Forest pay the usual expenses and then refund the amount to them afterwards.

Ald. Thon, Jones said if that was done then the whole thing was a farce, and the amount would have to be refunded many times during the winter.
