London, Nov. 2.—The war scare caused by the Hong Kong dispatch to the Times and Globe telling of the railway and other concessions China is supposed to have secretly made to Russia have been replaced in the public mind by the alarm felt at the rumore from Eastern quarters that Japan and Russia have formed, or are forming, an understanding which is to result to their mutual benefit. This new feature of the complications in the East caused a really cold chill to pass down the backs of her Majesty's Ministers, and the Premier is said to be shivering still.
