AN INTERESTING CASE

For the Kent Fall Assizes-Over Wm.

Pollard's Will-A Women in It. CHATHAM, Aug. 31 .- An interesting case is on the docket for the Kent Fall Assizes. It is that of Pollard vs. McRobert. The plaintiff, Geo. Pollard, is administrator for the estate of the late William Pollard, of Florence, and the detendant is Jane Mc-Robert, an hotelkeeper, of the same village. The alleged grounds of the action are that while the late William Pollard was alive, although over 70 years of age, he went to live with defe. dant, who rapidly secured a powerful influence over the old man. The latter took to drinking, soon got rid of his spare cash. About a year before his death he signed a deed conveying his farm, lot 16, con. 14, Dawn, to Mrs. McRobert on condition that she should support him for the remainder of his days, and give him \$100 per year. Suit is now entered to set aside this deed as obtained from a man incompetent to transact business without independent advice, and undue influence was used by defendant to secure the deed.
