Arrival of the Missing Steamer City of St. Augustine.

London, Feb. 18.—The British steamer Ganges, Capt. Roberts, which sailed from New Orleans Jan. 6 for Havre, broke her propeller and was towed to Corcubion. She started from there in tow for Havre, and when off the Island of Ushant, about 25 miles from Brest, she broke adrift from the tug towing her and has not been seen since. TOTALLY WRECKED. PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18 .- The Philadelphia barkentine Sadie A. Thompson, Capt. Mowatt, bound from Caribarien, Feb. 5. for this port with 5,600 bags of sugar valued at \$100,000 consigned to the Sugar Trust, has been totally wrecked on Memory Rock, Bahamas. The vessel is valued at \$50,000. Her crew is believed to have been landed safely.

FOUR DEAD MEN ON BOARD. LONDON, Feb. 18.-The Norwegian schooner Mauranger, Capt. Knudsen, has been towed into Valentia Bay and placed in quarintine. Her captain and the three ship's sailors are dead on board, and it is believed they died from yellow fever.

New York, Feb. 18.—A dispatch received at the Maritime exchange late this afternoon states that the missing steamer City of St. Augustine arrived at Bermuda short of coal. The steamer sailed from Jacksonville, Fla., on Feb. 2, and with ordinary weather should have reached this port on the 7th. She is commanded by Capt. Gaskill and has a crew of thirteen men. She left Jacksonville with 375,000 teet of lumber and was not seen after Feb. 5, a few miles north of Hateras, until she
