

DEADLY FEUD

Between Cattlemen and Sheep Raisers -3,000 Sheep Driven Over a

Precipice. Walsenburg, Col., Sept. 7.-Reports from Sharpsdale, a small town near Mount Blanco, in Southern Colorado, says that the feud over the use of

the range, between cattle men and sheep men, reached a climax this week, when the cattle men drove 3,000 sheep over a high precipice, killing nearly son, Kingston; grand constable, John all of them.
