MR. CALVERT'S CAMPAIGN

Progressing Favorably in West Middlesex—Enthusiastic Meeting at Wardsville—Stirring Addresses Made.

Mr. Calvert's campaign in West Middlesex is progressing most favorably. The energetic candidate is meeting with most gratifying receptions at all his meetings, and all indications point to the fact that he will be again returned by a majority which will run well up into the hundreds.

A very largely attended meeting was held in his interest at Wardsville on Friday evening, the 26th inst.

The town hall, in which the meeting was held, was packed to the doors by an enthusiastic audience, who manifested their sympathy with the candidate by their frequent applause.

The meeting was addressed by the candidate, and by Mr. F. P. Betts and Mr. P. E. Mackenzie, of London.

Mr. Mackenzie, in opening, referred to the recent tour of the premier and to his magnificent reception he had everywhere met with. He showed up the fealty of the Tory contention that no changes had been made in the tariff, and indicated the alterations that had been made, explaining incidentally the reasons for the benefits.

Mr. Betts, after congratulating the electors on their splendid turnout, commended their judgment in sending the present candidate to Ottawa in 1896. Mr. Calvert was an ideal representative, thoroughly conversant with the requirements of an agricultural community, a man of more than ordinary ability, and a man of high honor.

Views in the house in a manner to command attention. He had already made his mark at Ottawa, and would do still better work there in the next year. The fact that he had been selected for the high honor of representing the district in the House of Commons showed the esteem in which he was held by the other parliamentarians. The speaker, after cautioning the electors not to be misled by Sir Chas. Tupper's prophetic of victory for the opposition, traced the political history of the opposition leaders, who are asking to be again returned to power, pointing out that, with the exception of Hon. Hugh John Macdonald, they were the same men who so shamefully betrayed their trust in 1896 at the time of the "nest of traitors" incident.

In this connection, the speaker referred to the consternation which had on the previous day seized the opposition in learning that Sir Mackenzie had appeared on the platform in South Lanark to denounce Hon. John Haggart for his share in the conspiracy. It was a thunderbolt that would blast the last vestige of Tory chance of success in the present campaign. It would clinch the decision of thousands of the better class of Conservatives throughout the Dominion to support the present administration.

The speaker then dealt at length with the progressive policy of the Liberal Government, pointing out the business-like manner in which all their steps had been taken, and indicating the unprecedented prosperity which had resulted from their efforts, and referred, in closing, to the cross-purposes at which the leaders of the opposition found themselves on every important question.

Mr. Calvert referred to charges that had been made at a previous meeting at Wardsville, on the preceding night, that the Liberal Government had broken all its pledges, and proceeded to renege the charge by taking up the platform adopted by the Liberals at the Ottawa convention, dealing with it item by item. He proved the utter falsity of the charge made. He touched upon the various items in which retraction had been made. On the question of purity of administration, he defied anyone to point out any instance of corruption by the present government.

He dealt with the question of the provincial franchise and also the question of prohibition, which had been brought up by a speaker at the previous evening's meeting. He then dealt with the finances of the country, quoting statistics to prove his position that the country's finances are in a thoroughly healthy state. He spoke of the advance made in the postoffice department, and showed the falsity of the charges made against the administration of the Yukon. He referred to the sending of the Canadian contingents, and showed that the conduct of the Liberal administration was beyond attack in that matter.

The meeting closed shortly after 11, with cheers for the Queen, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the candidate.
