LITTLE PROSPECT OF RELIEF. Washington, July 1.—The hot wave n Washington shows no signs of breaking. At 8 o'clock this morning the down town thermometers register ed 85 degrees, and at 9 o'clock the mercury had climbed up to 92 degrees. This is 7 degrees hotter than it was at 9 o'clock yesterday morning.
