Salonica, European Turkey, Jan. 8.—A return issued by the Turkish authorities shows that 1,022 casualties resulted from the fighting in Macedonia between Turkish troops and Bulgarian, Greek and Servian revolutionary bands during 1905. Altogether 119 encounters took place in the vilayets of Salonica, Monastir and Uskub, in which the insurgents lost 520 men killed and 20 wounded. In addition the troops captured 225 prisoners.
