REFUSES SCRUTINY OF OPTION BALLOTS

St. Thomas, Feb. 10.—Judge Colter has decided that the 39 unmarked ballots found among the ballots cast in the recent voting on local option in the Township of Dunwich cannot be scrutinized. He takes the ground that the applica-

tion for the scrutiny was not made in time to permit him to act. A mandamus may be asked for on behalf of the interested hotelmen to compel the judge to grant the scrutiny. Local option was carried by a small majority of votes. Should the 39 votes be allowed to count against the measure, a blank ballot having been held by some of the courts to count as a negative vote, local option would be defeated.

RESURFACE DOWN TOWN PAVEMENT

City Council Will Make an Effort to Shift the Cost to the Property Owners.

FIGHT WITH ST. RAILWAY

Board of Works Decide to Take Bulb by Horns and Remove the Snow From the Streets.

At the meeting of the board of works, held last evening, the question of resurfacing the Richmond and Dundas street pavements, was taken up, and the opinion of the solicitor will be obtained as to whether or not the city has power to lay the pavements this year.

A letter was read from City Engineer Graydon recommending that the last payment on the debentures was due this year, and he thought that the work could be done and payments made next year. He recommended that the street railway allowance be done in brick.

Costly Repairs.
The committee agreed with the suggestion. It was pointed out by Mr. Graydon that the city paid \$2,400 each year for repairs, and during the past five years had paid out over \$10,000 on this work. The cost he estimated to be \$22,700.

"The idea is a good one," said Mayor Beattie. "The difficulty has been that the debentures were for 20 years longer than the Barber Company's guarantee, and we have been unable to do anything. I am not quite clear as to the right of the city to do this work this year, and he thought that we had better allow the chairman and the engineer to interview Mr. Meredith on the subject."

"We can save at least \$2,000 this year if we can resurface the pavement," said Ald. Saunders. "The mayor's suggestion is the proper one." It was agreed to, and Ald. Tancook and Mr. Graydon will see Mr. Meredith on the matter at once.

A number of residents on Horton street complained of the smoke from the temporary pumping plant on Horton street. As this plant is under the direction of the water commissioners at the present time it was decided to refer the complaints to that body.

Charge to Street Railway.

City Engineer Graydon was instructed to put several teams at work removing snow, and charge the cost to the London street railway. The committee considered that the company was not making sufficient headway in removing snow.

"We appreciate what they have done," said Ald. Morgan, "but we are not satisfied."

Ald. Morgan considered that seven teams were insufficient to remove the snow from 35 miles of track.

City Engineer Graydon was instructed by the chairman, with the consent of the committee, to put on twenty teams, if necessary, to remove snow sufficient to make the streets safe for traffic.

Claim for Damages.

The claim of Tennent & Campbell for damages for injuries to Miss Rebecca Ferguson, who fell and broke her leg on Richmond street, was referred to City Solicitor Meredith to defend if suit is entered.

Mr. Albert E. Aitkens, boiler inspector, reported that the boilers at the city hall were in good condition.

Numbering Houses.

City Engineer Graydon will obtain information as to the method of numbering houses, and the erection of street signs in other cities, to be submitted to the committee, when tenders will be called for. Ald. Pocock will move at the next meeting of the council that every house be numbered, and that if the work is not completed within a stated period the city be given power to do the work and charge it up to the property-owners.

Anonymous Letters.

A couple of anonymous letters, were read regarding the work of No. 2 committee. One was from a Conservative, who protested that the "Grits" were getting too many jobs. The other gentleman had all sorts of complaints to make. As no letter was signed, they were placed in the waste-paper basket and no attention was paid to the information they were supposed to contain.

Those present were: Ald. Tancook, chairman; Ald. Pocock, Ald. Morgan, Ald. Saunders, Mayor Beattie, City Engineer Graydon and Secretary Wright.

CHINESE MISSIONARY LEFT BIG FORTUNE

Poor and Elderly Teacher Falls Heir to a Million.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 10.—Mrs. Mary Booth, more than 60 years old, who has been eking out an existence as a teacher in a local Chinese mission, round herself today heiress to \$1,000,000 property and money to this amount having been willed her by George D. Nelson, of Springfield, Mass., who died a few days ago, leaving a \$5,000,000 estate.

H. C. King, an attorney, who became interested in Mrs. Booth's story, and worked on the case for a contingent fee, will receive \$470,000. Nelson was the coachman of Mrs. Emma G. Vinton. After her death a will was found leaving her entire fortune to him. Mrs. Booth was Mrs. Vinton's sister, and Nelson, always friendly to her, made her one of his heirs.

TOWN COUNCIL QUILTS

Aldermanic Fathers of Vankleek Hill Have Resigned.

Toronto, Feb. 10.—The entire town council of the town of Vankleek Hill resigned in a body this afternoon as a result of the quo warranto proceedings launched against them at Osgoode Hall. The question of costs alone remains for the court to decide.

It was charged that the mayor, reeve and councillors had not made proper statutory declarations before the official clerk. It was also alleged that two of them had outstanding accounts against the municipality.

HYDE IS CHARGED WITH SWOPE'S DEATH

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 11.—As a climax to the lengthy investigation of the mysterious death of Col. Thomas H. Swope, on Oct. 3, 1909, Dr. B. C. Hyde, husband of the late millionaire's niece, was arrested here yesterday, charged with his murder in the first degree. The warrant was issued at the request of Attorney John G. Paxton, executor of the Swope estate, and charges that Dr. Hyde, with felonious intent, administered strychnine to Col. Swope on the day of his death.

GAYNOR BOOM FORMING

Missouri Democrats Want to Start the Mayor Toward White House.

New York, Feb. 11.—Mayor Gaynor is likely presidential timber in the eyes of some Missouri Democrats. He received a letter today inviting him to attend a dinner in Springfield, Mo., April 16, the 167th anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson, and the invitation intimates that he is looked on in Missouri as the national leader of democracy for 1912. The mayor has not yet signified his assent, but arrangements are under way to launch his boom whether he attends or not. Col. Henry Watterston has been asked to propose the toast, "Has New York Another Tilden?" and former Judge Augustus Van Wyck has been asked to answer "Yes."
