YANKEES INTO A REAL BALL TEAM

HAL CHASE, GREATEST FIRST BASEMAN IN THE GAME.

Players and critics alike are unanimous in giving a big majority of the
credit for the showing the New York Yankees have made this season to Hal
Chase, the wonderful first-sacker of the team. It is freely predicted that
Chase will succeed Stallings as manager of the team next year, and it is gen-
erally believed now that it is Hal's brain which directs the Yankees, both
on the offense and on the defense.
Chase is the greatest first-sacker the game has ever known. Fred Ten-
ny first showed that a first-sacker could be something more than a figure for
other members of the team to throw a ball at. He plays deep, probably deeper
than any other first baseman, is marvellously fast and hits well.
The big fellow is just a youngster, and should be a dominating figure in
the baseball world for years to come, as he takes excellent care of himself.
Last season he was sore and left the team. This year he was made captain
when the Yanks were training down south, and since that time his ball-play-
ing has been making the American League fans sit up and watch him very
closely.

GILLET MAKES
POSITION CLEAR

Governor of California, Who
Ordered Fight Off, Says
"No Chance."

RENO MAKES AN OFFER

Businessmen Will Build Arena and
Buy the Thousand-Dollar Govern-
ment License.

[By Associated Press.]
San Francisco, June 17.—Unless an un-
foreseen shift occurs in the fight situa-
tion, a definite announcement that Jeffries
and Johnson will come together for their
championship battle at Reno, Nevada, is
expected today from Promoter Rickard,
who said today:
"It is safe to say that the fight will
take place at Reno. I am not going to
waste any more time or money in Cali-
fornia. But Jeffries to Johnson, I have
wasted on the 4th of July even if I have
to take to the Montana desert to hold the
fight and even if it breaks me."
That there is no intention on the part
of the state authorities to recede from
their position is clearly indicated in the
latest pronouncements of the governor
and attorney-general. Governor Gillet
says: "I understand that many men have
arranged to come to California to see
Jeffries and Johnson fight. To them I
want to say that they need have no
doubt about the situation. There will be
no fight between Jeffries and Johnson in
California."
To Stop It by Force.
Attorney-General Webb says: "There
will be no fight between Jeffries and
Johnson nor between Kaufman and Leung-
ford. The latter fight, which is sched-
uled for Saturday, will be stopped by
force if the principals and promoters
make such action necessary. My inten-
tion is to file a petition today asking for
a restraining order."
It is reported that arrangements are
under way for the erection of an arena
at Reno. According to Rickard's state-
ment he will leave for Reno Sunday

morning if the local situation has not
cleared and take personal charge of pre-
parations there.
"As everyone knows," he said, "the
laws of Nevada are explicit, and in that
state there is nothing to prevent a dozen
fights a day taking place as long as a
regular permit is secured for each con-
test."

Reno Makes an Offer.
"Aylesworth, a Reno man, in whom I
have the greatest confidence, has wired
me that Reno people will build us an
arena free of cost and provide us with
a license. The lumber will come from
the Truckee Mills and the arena can be
erected wherever necessary in ten days.
It will not be as big as the one we have
been putting up in San Francisco, but at
that it will be big enough. It will hold
about 20,000 spectators."
"I have word from both Jeffries and
Johnson that they will fight anywhere I
want them to—Jeffries says on a barge if
he has to."
The San Francisco Hotelmen's Associa-
tion has adopted resolutions condemning
the efforts to prevent the fight.
The resolutions recited that for many
years ring contests have been permitted
in California without interference and
that it will work a great hardship to stop
the present fight on account of the large
number of visitors it would draw to the
city.

Jack Worries Over Auto.
Jack Johnson seems to be worrying
more over the attachment of his auto
mobile by George Little, his deposed man-
ager, than over the fight middle. But
not of his troubles is affecting his ap-
petite. After his workout he stood on
the scales and found that he had gained
two pounds in the last two days, tipping
the beam at 215. The champion said he
probably would do only light gymnasium
work today.
