Provincial Secretary Removes Objections of Ontario to Hunting in North.

Toronto, Sept. 29.—If the Federal Government can be persuaded to allow hunters in York County to take dogs from the "rabies zone" into the north country to hunt deer this fall, the Provincial Government is not likely to raise any objection. A large and influential deputation of hunters was informed to that effect by Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, at the Parliament Buildings yesterday.

DETECTIVES MAY GO

TO UNITED STATES

It Is Rumored That Mahoney and Campeau Will Accept Offers.

Chatham, Ont., Sept. 29.—People here were somewhat surprised at the tone of an interview with Supt. Rogers, of the provincial police, appearing in the papers. No one here made any specific charges against either Rogers or his men, though the Enos murder mystery was left to unravel itself so far as the provincial detectives were concerned.

It is rumored that neither Detective Campeau nor Detective Mahoney will return to the provincial force after being suspended, and having their salaries cut by the department. It is understood both have been offered better jobs on the other side. These two men were about the only police protection available for the rural sections along Western Ontario's border line.

LOST IN THE WOODS.

Kenora, Sept. 28.—Grave fears are entertained for Charles Jones and J. McCann, both C. P. R. switch foremen, who left on a hunting trip in a motor launch on Sept. 20. When they did not return on Friday, as expected, a search party was organized on Sunday, returning Monday night, having found Jones' launch with his coat and all provisions in it, except probably sufficient for a couple of meals. They found no other signs of the men, but the canoe they had is missing, the men having evidently started from camp in it, so there still is hope that they will turn up safely.

CALL FOR TENDERS

FOR AN AUTO ENGINE

No. 3 Committee So Decided at a Meeting Held Last Night.

At the meeting of No. 3 committee last night it was decided to call for tenders for a 700, 800 and 900-gallon automobile fire engine, and for a steam engine of 1,000 gallons capacity. Tenders will be received at the earliest possible time, and the engine purchased as soon as possible.

Ald. Asplund thought the whole council should be called together, and discuss the question further. Mayor Beattie did not consider this necessary as they could be called together when there was something of a definite nature to present to them.

Fire Chief Aitken submitted a report on the trip to Detroit, and explained the good points in favor of an auto engine. He was well pleased with what he had seen in Detroit, and he thought such an engine would be a success in London.

The cost was estimated at \$8,500 on the American side. Delivered in London it would be practically \$11,500. It would displace five horses and three men, if installed.

CORRESPONDENCE

Queen's Park for the People.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:—Absence from the city prevented me from tendering you at an earlier date a few words to say how heartily I concur with your editorial commendation of the improved condition of the Western Fair this year, particularly the absence of the Midway, with its vulgar fakir and dog-grading features. Legitimate exhibitors, and all persons with the best interests of the community at heart, should cordially support the management in respect to the future of the fair.

The fair board exchequer may be increased by the sale of such privileges, but no monetary return deserves consideration when the educational influence is wrong. If an added air of "diversity" to that portion of the grounds is desired, there is a popular and easy way of providing it in the shape of a tournament or superior programme of band music, rather than concentrating everything before the grand stand, the quality of which might with advantage be raised in standard, judged from what I heard during and since the exhibition in the way of public comment.

The Western Fair is a paying concern, and a good thing for London; by all means let it be kept clean and progressive.

Intimations are being made from time to time that the needs of the exhibition are outgrowing the grounds. Just how far this may be true now or in the future I am not prepared to say, but as a London and Western Ontario exhibition, there are limits to which it can be wisely expanded, and a policy of conservative compromise has a good deal to commend it from the standpoint of the city taxpayer. Hints are being thrown out as to what might be made by the closing of old Queen's Park and its sale in lots for building purposes, but who knows what outlay would be involved in the ex-plotting of new grounds and buildings? In any event, I am distinctly opposed to the destruction of this beautiful tree-clad park for the loss of which no cash balance would be an adequate compensation. I protest against it on behalf of the workers.
