"The fact was that the trial of the action against the Grocers' Guild did not take place until 1910, and the prosecution against the Stamped Ware Association was abandoned before the grocers' case came up. In every other case except the Grocers' Guild a conviction was secured. Proseeution under the customs act was a natter for the Dominion Government to decide, and did not enter into the present discussion.


