SARNIA WOULD BE A C. N. R. TERMINAL

Every Effort Will Be Made to
Secure New Radial
Line.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Sarnia, May 3.—It is likely that an effort will be made here to induce the Canadian Northern Railway to bring one of their radial lines to Sarnia instead of Grand Bend. The company it is reported, intends to construct a system of electric lines, one of which will be a road to Lake Huron, by way of Grand Bend. Boosters here, however, will doubtless try to bring the line to Sarnia, arguing that this town is more logically situated for the proposed line than Grand Bend.

If the road should come here it would mean a vast increase of trade from the surrounding country, and

would add greatly to the lengthy list of summer resorters who spend the season here. Also it would be the means of forcing the Grand Trunk and Pere Marquette Railroads to adopt special rates to Sarnia during the tourist months, a plan which they have steadily ignored, and which has been earnestly advocated by local men interested in the resorting business for some time. It is understood that the Canadian Northern is very anxious to construct this proposed line to Lake Huron, but it is not believed that they had an important object in view when they chose Grand Bend other than attaining the lake, and it is hoped here that when the many superior advantages Sarnia contains are drawn to their notice, that they will change their plans in favor of this town. A new railroad here and especially an electric line would do wonders for the local beachers, both in the real estate and excursion line.

"I believe," said one of the members of the council, "that both Sarnia and Port Huron should combine in endeavoring to get this road into here. Of course we would benefit the most thereby, but Port Huron would

also come in for its share of the trade and the resorters."

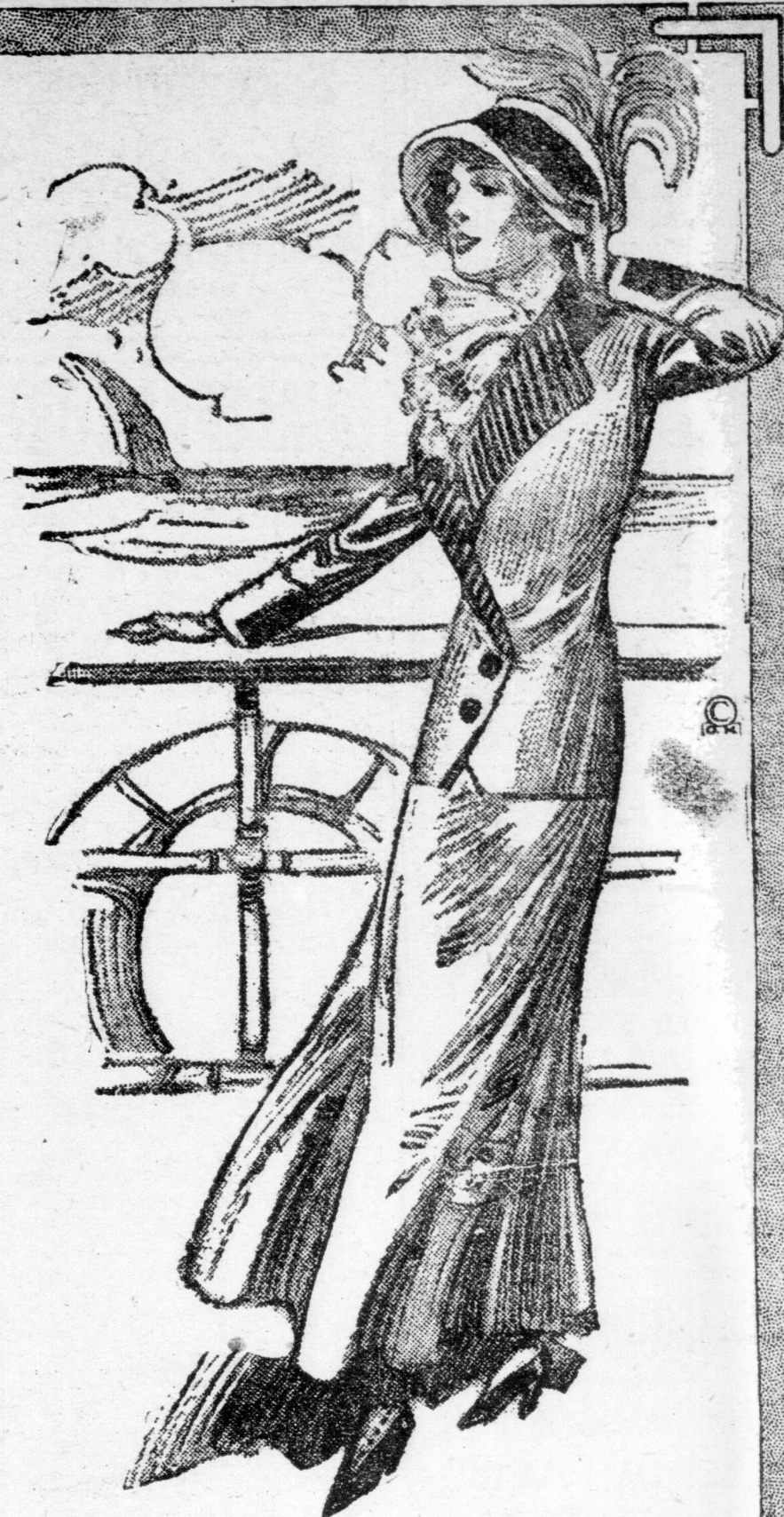

SALARY FIXED AT \$1,000 A YEAR

Council Confirms Appointment
of A. M. Piper as Building
Inspector.

A MATTER OF TENDERS

Only One Offer Received To Construct
the Incinerator Plant, and the
Matter Was Deferred.

At a special meeting of the city council, held on Thursday afternoon, the appointment of Mr. A. M. Piper as building inspector for four months was ratified. The salary was reduced from \$100 a month to the rate of \$1,000 a year. The contract for the incinerator was not let.

The appointment of Mr. Piper at \$100 a month was recommended by No. 3 committee. Ald. Richter thought the question had not been sufficiently considered by the council. He wanted to know whether or not a practical builder, a man with experience, would not be better qualified to test and oversee the construction of buildings than an architect. He favored the appointment of a builder.

However, Mayor Graham declared that all the arguments were in favor of an architect, who was trained to know the qualities of materials, etc. His training was general, not particular.

Ald. Bennett said that the salary was rather high, and suggested that it be placed at the rate of \$1,000 a year. This, he thought, would be sufficient. This motion carried.

The incinerator plant. A minority report submitting the tender of Lawrie & Lamb, Montreal, to install and equip an incinerator for the sum of \$39,750, was presented by Ald. Coles, but was laid over.

"I think we should have an opportunity of looking into this matter before we decide on it," declared Ald. Richter. "The plans, specifications, tender and everything connected with it should be given to the aldermen, so they would be in a position to vote intelligently on the matter. We can not decide on the tender until we do get that information."

"We would like to know whether or not tenders had been called for," asked Ald. Johnston. "I think it is most important that we get more than one tender if possible. We are not rushed for a day or two, and the whole business could easily stand over. Surely there are other concerns manufacturing this class of machinery."

Mayor Graham explained that there was no intention to spring the deal on the council.

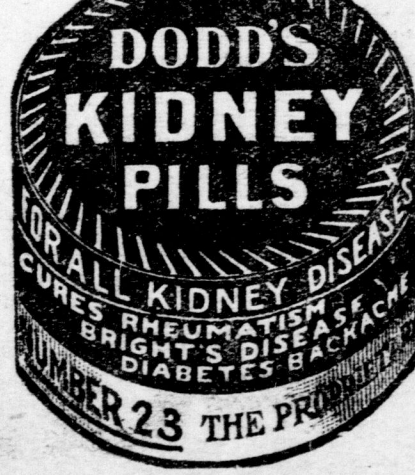

OFFICERS TO BLAME

Captain Brown, of Government Steamer Suspended Over Accident.

Ottawa, May 2.—Another moral from the Atlantic that caution has prior claims to speed in navigation was drawn this morning by Captain Demers, Dominion wreck commissioner, in making his report on the grounding of the Government steamship Earl Grey, near Picton, N. S., a fortnight ago. The ship grounded in a fog, and was rather seriously damaged.

Pilot McGregor, Fraser was also found to have been negligent, and Second Officer Gallant is reported to have lacked the necessary technical qualifications for the position. He and Captain Brown are suspended, which practically means the permanent loss of their positions. The pilot was reported to the Pilotage Commission at Picton for discipline.
