WESTERN ONTARIO NEWS

EVERY COW SHOULD BE TESTED REGULARLY

Importance of Systematic Work Urged by Agricultural College Expert.

Simcoe, Jan. 31.—Two hundred and fifty farmers gathered here in attendance at the first annual dairy institute conducted by the local branch of the department of agriculture, with the Norfolk Holstein-Friesian Breeders' Club. The judging classes were in charge of A. C. Hallman, of Breslau, and George Laidlaw, of Aylmer, two breeders prominent in dairy circles. A practical address on bovine tuberculosis was delivered by Dr. Arthur Burr. The tuberculosis test, he said, revealed the presence of tubercle bacilli. Better sanitation in stables, fresh air and sunshine were instrumental in the prevention of the disease.

Prof. Dean, of the Ontario Agricultural College, emphasized the necessity of testing every animal in the herd. Only in that way could a farmer know the real value of the individual animals and the source of his profits.

A feature of the evening session was the announcement of a new Canadian record in the two-year-old class by the cow Ardella Dekol Tensen, owned by Mason Bros., of Tyrrell.

PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Gosfield Man Alleged to Have Left Unpaid Promissory Note.

Windsor, Jan. 31.—Thomas Norman, who departed hurriedly from Gosfield South five years ago, leaving behind an unpaid and overdue promissory note, has discovered that though "the mills of the gods grind slowly they grind exceedingly small." Yesterday Norman, for whose arrest a warrant was issued at the time of his disappearance, returned to Gosfield. He was recognized at once and taken into custody. Detroit, Jan. 31.—E. H. B. Cull, division freight agent of the Wabash Railway and a former well-known Canadian, died at his home here today from an attack of acute gastritis. He had been confined at home only a few days.

Mr. Cull was chief representative in this district of the Wabash freight traffic department and came into direct contact with the industries, transportation organizations and officials of the city. He was widely known and well liked.

Mr. Cull was born in Seaforth, Ont., 49 years ago, and after attending school in Woodstock, came to Detroit and entered the employ of the Wabash Railway. He is survived by his wife, two daughters and a son. The funeral services will be held on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at St. Paul's Cathedral, and will be conducted by Rev. Dr. John McCarroll, of St. Paul's Cathedral.

LOCAL OPTION STILL HAS GOOD MAJORITY

The Ballots Were Scrutinized at Kincardine Before County Judge Barrett

FIVE WERE DISQUALIFIED

No Judgment Will Be Given Until the West Lorne Case Is Decided.

Kincardine, Jan. 31.—The scrutiny of ballots cast in the recent local option vote was made today before Judge Barrett and a decision is eagerly awaited all through this district. Local option people are very indignant at the methods pursued by the hotel people to quash the bylaw. Mr. J. P. Haverson, K. C., of Toronto, represented the appellants. Mr. W. E. Raney, K. C., of Toronto, and Mr. J. H. Scott, K. C., of Walkerton, represented the local option people.

The question of procedure took up some time. Mr. Raney said he understood that a number of witnesses had been subpoenaed by the appellants to be examined as to their qualification. The point he made was the doubt as to the jurisdiction of the county judge to hear such evidence. Judges at Oskode Hall had decided both ways. A majority of them had decided that a county judge had not such jurisdiction. He pointed out that the question was now under consideration by the supreme court at Ottawa in the West Lorne case, and he asked that the taking of evidence as to qualification of voters be not proceeded with pending the handing down of the supreme court judgment.

Mr. Haverson asked that the judge act on the law as it had been declared by the court of appeal for Ontario.

Judge Barrett decided to take all the evidence and reserve his decision until the West Lorne case was handed down.

Gives Bylaw Two More.

The scrutiny of the ballots was then proceeded with, and after the four wards had been examined, the temperance people were gainers by two votes on the whole.

The qualification of voters was then gone into, and it was found that five voters had not the right to vote. The temperance people could lose these, and still have the required majority.

The hotel people then placed Robert T. Walker in the box, and his evidence is as follows:

"I voted in St. George's ward on Jan. 6 on the local option bylaw. I also voted in St. Patrick's ward."

W. B. Raney—Did you mark two ballots, one at each place, on the local option bylaw?

Mr. Walker—I certainly did.

Asked why he voted twice, he said he had always voted on bylaws in every ward.

Will Still Win.

Robert T. Walker is a man seventy-eight years of age. He was in the hotel business for many years, and now owns the Queen Hotel here. He was the most active opponent of the local option bylaw. As the count of the ballots stands, the bylaw may lose five votes and still have the required three-fifths.

Mr. Raney, evidence of non-residents showed that four or possibly five non-residents had voted on the bylaw. At all events he had to show that one more bad vote was needed to defeat the bylaw, and that explained his action.

Mr. Walker proved that he had committed the offence of double voting.

Desperate Expedient.

Mr. Raney pointed out that in taking this course he was adopting a desperate expedient, and one which was made possible only by the judgment of the court of appeal in the West Lorne case.

By voting a second time Mr. Walker had nullified a vote and a half cast by the bylaw by persons entitled to vote. By Mr. Haverson's course it was now proposed to strike the bad vote off the total and off the vote for the bylaw. In other words, Mr. Walker had voted cast in defiance of the law, and for casting which he was liable to a penalty, was to be made do the duty of nullifying two votes and a half cast for the bylaw.

Of the six votes attacked by Mr. Haverson three are said to have been cast for the bylaw and three against. But under the West Lorne decision if the judgment of the court of appeal is affirmed all will be deducted from the vote in favor of the bylaw.

RESENTS DISMISSAL OF DR. CAMPBELL

Brantford Expositor Says That a Better Explanation is Needed.

Brantford Expositor: Some better explanation is needed from the Government of the dismissal of Dr. Campbell than the curt statement that the act was "for the good of the service." In Brantford alone the late inspector has hundreds of friends in the ranks of both political parties, who will resent the summary removal of a man at whose door no charge of wrongdoing has ever been laid.

If the Dominion Government will fix a "dead line" of say 65, beyond which no man shall be permitted to continue in the civil service, no particular fault could be found, but without any such rule the removal of a man of Dr. Campbell's well-known activity on the part of his age is manifestly only a subterfuge.

SETTLES DEBT TO GOVT.

Ottawa, Jan. 31.—The postmaster at the department of customs this morning handed in a letter from Boston addressed to the Minister of Customs and stamped for special delivery. When the envelope was opened it was found to contain \$28 in bills and a short memorandum unsigned. The money, it was explained, represented the difference between the duty collected on a shipment from the United States and the amount which should have been collected had not the goods been entered at an undervaluation.

This is the first time that the department has ever been paid up in this way for loss of duty through a fraudulent entry, although it is believed that much revenue is lost by the method of undervaluation.

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SCHEFF DIVORCES AUTHOR-HUSBAND

The Noted Opera Singer Is No Longer Wife of John Fox, the Novelist.

New York, Jan. 31.—Papers granting an interlocutory decree of divorce to Fritz Scheff from her husband, John Fox, Jun., were filed in the office of the county clerk at White Plains today. The decree was granted by Justice Keogh. The same degree of secrecy that has characterized all the proceedings leading up to the divorce prevailed with the filing of the papers. The papers were not made public.

Fritz Scheff is touring Illinois with the comic opera, called "The Love Wager." There has been talk of domestic difficulties between the writer and the singer, whom Paderewski called "the little devil of grand opera." Ever since the early part of last summer, Miss Scheff gave out denials that there was any trouble at the time that hearings in the suit were going on.

There was a sharp clash of temperaments, the author and student on the one hand, and the vivacious, pliant singer on the other, that made it impossible for them to live together any longer, according to their friends.

KILLED BY FALL FROM HIS BEDROOM WINDOW

Thomas Niven Found Lying Dead on Sidewalk by Relatives.

Harriston, Jan. 31.—Thomas Niven, aged 72, early today fell from his bedroom window to the street below, where his body was found about 7 o'clock.

Dr. H. R. McCullough, coroner, was called, and decided that no inquest was necessary. The deceased resided with his daughter, Mrs. David Sutherland, and received from her and her family the most careful and affectionate attention. For some time back, although enjoying good physical health, he had been failing mentally. A week ago he fell on the icy sidewalk and had not fully recovered from the shock. The family heard no unusual sound during the night and were unaware of his death until his body was found.

He was born in Ayrshire, Scotland, and came to Canada fifty-five years ago. He took up residence in this locality, and before the advent of the railway was a well-known teamster between Harriston and Guelph. Remarking to Paisley, he was baggage-man for the W. G. and B. Railway for some years, then became buyer and shipper of grain. Eight years ago he retired and returned to Harriston. His wife predeceased him many years ago. He was a member of the Sons of Scotland, and is survived by two daughters, Mrs. David Sutherland and Miss Lizzie, both of Harriston. His remains will be interred in the Harriston Cemetery on Monday.
