HORTICULTURISTS TO RAISE MEMBERSHIP TO 1,000 NEXT YEAR

Season Just Closed Is Best in
Society's History.

W. E. POTTS PRESIDENT

Many Handsome Premiums
Have Been Given to
Flower Growers.

Reports presented last night at the annual meeting of the London Horticultural Society show that the organization has just completed the most successful year in its history. The membership at present is 556 and it is planned to increase it to 1,000, at least, in 1917.

During the past year floral premiums, valued at many times the cost of membership, have been distributed, and all who received them have been delighted with the results obtained.

The financial statement presented by Secretary A. M. Hunt showed a balance of \$122.58.

A committee composed of President E. S. Potts, S. F. Wood and W. A. Hayden was named to arrange for the premiums for the next year.

W. H. Bartlett was appointed superintendent of flower shows and A. M. Hunt, secretary.

SINK TEST WELL ON FOSTER PROPERTY, IS BOARD'S LATEST PLAN

Long Discussion on Water
Supply at Meeting.

MAY SECURE EXPERT

Commission Wants Engineer
Chipman to Go Over
the Ground.

The utilities commission will sink a well on the Foster property across the road from the MacGregor wells on the Pipe Line road, in order to discover whether or not there is water on the place. In addition, strainers, etc., will be attached to the well on the MacGregor property in order to give a proper test as to the capacity of the well.

This was the result of a long discussion on the well situation. Cal S. Parker submitted a report from Engineer Bell, St. Thomas, to the effect that there was plenty of water in the MacGregor wells, that a self-filling reservoir was feasible, and that the water would flow by gravity to the Horton street station.

He expected a report on the same proposition from R. O. Wynne-Roberts, Toronto, who made an inspection, and had tested the strata. There was no doubt in the minds of the engineers that the wells would produce large amounts of water, and that a reservoir scheme was right and feasible.

Will investigate.

Commissioner Mitchell suggested the appointment of Willis Chipman to investigate the whole field, the MacGregor wells, the Foster and Topping properties, and all the land in the neighborhood for water.

If we can get a large quantity of water there, we will save thousands of dollars annually in pumping," he said.

Commissioner Farabee suggested experimenting on the Foster property, and it was decided to do so. Driller Harvey will sink a well at once, and report in two weeks time. One of the MacGregor wells will be sunk deeper, and a strainer will be attached.

The discussion was long, but nothing new developed in it.

WANT AUDITOR'S REPORT BEFORE REPAIRING BYLAW

The finance committee of the city council, at the session last evening, decided to lay the question of preparing bylaws to raise \$125,000 for repairs on the London and Port Stanley over until the report of City Auditor Dunlop on the finances of the road.

The committee was asked to submit a statement to the Council as to the term of the debentures, the number of years they are to run, the amount of interest to be paid, etc. The committee thought it best to lay the matter over until the report of the auditor is received on Monday evening next.

The complaint of Ald. Copp and the residents of Stanley street against the excessive whistling on the G. T. R. was sent to the police commission, with a request that the police officers enforce the bylaws governing this matter.

A number of accounts were passed.

CALL APPLICATIONS FOR PERMANENT SECRETARY

The Soldiers' Aid Commission, at a session yesterday afternoon, decided to call for applications for the position of permanent secretary. Applications must be in the hands of George T. Brown, the president, by November 7, and must state salary expected for full time. Two applications were received, but were not dealt with. One was for full time and the other for part time only.

"It is my opinion that applications should be called for," said Lieut.-Col. A. A. Campbell. "The public should know that we are in a position to appoint a permanent secretary."

Controller John M. Moore seconded the resolution. He wanted the best man available named for the position.

Honorary Secretary Sam King suggested the appointment of Ed Lance, in the hands of George T. Brown, but the committee did not agree with this, and decided to call for applicants.

MINISTER'S CAR UPSETS.

KINTOKE, Nov. 2.—An automobile accident, in which four persons had narrow escapes, occurred just east of Kintoke yesterday morning, when Rev. Dr. McDonald, accompanied by Mrs. A. A. Campbell, and Miss Lenora Armstrong, were starting out to motor to Kitchener to attend the Sunday school convention being held there. In turning out to pass a wagon the wheel of the car went into a rut, which caused it to turn over, throwing the occupants out, but not seriously injuring any of them. Beyond a slight shaking-up, fortunately the car escaped with such slight damage that the party was able to proceed in a short time.
