City Briefs

WRIT ISSUED.—D. J. Matheson of Komoka, through his solicitors, Buchner & Ramsey, has issued a writ in the county court against N. Cohn of Windsor for \$515.15, the amount of a promissory note alleged to have been made on August 24, 1915.

KIWANIS LUNCHEON FRIDAY.—Rev. Perry Dobson, principal of Alma College, St. Thomas, who is also a member of the Kiwanis Club, will be the speaker at the Kiwanis Club noon-day luncheon at the Tecumseh House today.

THREE FINGERS AMPUTATED.—Robert Smith, a brakeman on the C. & P. R., suffered a badly-crushed right hand when he got the appendage caught in a coupling while on duty in the east-end yards yesterday afternoon. He was taken to Victoria Hospital, where it was found necessary to partially amputate three fingers.

SEEKING U. EXTENSION COURSES.—The growing importance of the University of Western Ontario was clearly indicated by several requests received by Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown, that the extension course of the university be extended to cover organizations in many points outside of the city. Clubs of various descriptions, libraries, teachers' institutes and various other organizations have sent in urgent requests for lectures.

THREE BICYCLES STOLEN.—Three bicycles were reported to the police as stolen yesterday. One belonged to Harold Neil, 465 Dorinda street, was taken from a garage just north of Dundas street. Its number was 27053. Clayton Thompson, 556 Colborne street, reported his bicycle, which was taken from the Pettit Pattern Works, 455 Dundas street, and bore number 20555.

ASSISTANT TO DEAN TUCKER.—Rev. Dennis Bright, of St. Catharines, has been appointed assistant to Rev. Norman Tucker at St. Paul's Cathedral. Mr. Bright served with the overseas forces for a period of four years, and has been a professor at Ridley College for the past two years. The couple of years, and the new assistant is especially well qualified to handle this branch of the work in addition to his parochial duties.

NEW MOTORCYCLE COPS.—Two dismissals and two appointments have been made in connection with the motorcycle squad of the London police force within the past few weeks. Constable Albert Cowie and Constable Spearman, who were motorcycle officers, have left the force, and Constable David McLeod and Ernest Inch have been appointed as their successors. Constable Monahan has been on the force for several years, and has had previous experience in the operation of motor vehicles. He was taken on the strength several months ago.

STRUCK BY AUTO.—A lad named Flemming, who is said to live on Lorne avenue east, was struck by a motor car at Dundas and Charlotte streets, about 9 o'clock Wednesday night while he was riding a bicycle. He sustained severe bruises and abrasions to the face and body. After medical aid was summoned he was removed to his home. Witnesses of the accident state that the boy attempted to turn on to Charlotte street off Dundas in front of a motor car, and misjudged the speed at which the car was traveling. The motorist drove to the curb and stopped in a vain attempt to avoid hitting the lad.

REPORT INCORRECT.—Denial of the report published in a local paper this morning to the effect that Thomas Adams, Dominion town planner, of Ottawa, will be paid a sum not to exceed \$5,000, for three years service to the city of London, was made by Mayor T. J. Murphy, chairman of the London Town Planning Commission, today. "That is a mistake," Mr. Murphy informed The Advertiser. "That reporter is wrong. The agreement to be signed calls for a payment of \$500 this year, \$1,250 in 1922, and a similar amount in 1923, which amounts to my arithmetic totals \$3,000. The report published is not very accurate, being \$5,000 out."

It is expected that Ald. John Bridge, who was also appointed to the London railway commission by the city council last January, will also resign as a railway commissioner, otherwise, according to city officials, he can be disqualified from acting as alderman, according to City Clerk S. Baker. It is understood that September 1 was the time limit for the act for such resignations to be tendered, but it is intimated that no action will be taken to unseat Ald. Bridge, provided that he resigns before the next city council meeting.

A few weeks ago, Ald. Bridge informed The Advertiser that he was resigning by September 1, which date, he stated, was the time limit. However, his resignation has not yet been received by City Clerk S. Baker, who says: "Ald. Bridge can now be disqualified, according to the statute."

"INTENT TO HARM" MAY BE ADDED TO CHARGE OF ASSAULT

J. A. Aked, Accused, Under \$100 Bail, Pending Adjournment of Case.

Judging from the evidence presented in police court this morning, J. A. Aked dealt James Persall a cowardly blow on the face at their rooming house a few days ago. Persall, who is a street railway motorman, said that he was sitting on the verandah of his stopping place reading a newspaper, when Aked came out of the house and remarked that a certain girl had told him that Persall had no use for him. He figured Persall says, Aked struck him before he had time to get up from his seat. Three stitches were required to close the wound inflicted on his face. He figured that he would lose four working days as a result, and would have a doctor's bill to pay.

Aked Pleaded Guilty.

Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett decided to adjourn the case for one week and place it in the hands of the crown attorney in order that he might, if he chose, change the charge from common assault to assault with intent to do bodily injury. Aked may face this more serious charge next week. He was told by the court, who termed the assault "outrageous," that he had better come to police court prepared to recompense Persall for his loss of time, for any doctor bills which Persall might be taxed with, and also to pay a fine. Aked is now out on \$100-bail.

URGES PEOPLE BE TAUGHT TO COME CLOSER TOGETHER

Rev. Perry Dobson of St. Thomas Calls It Big Movement.

SAYS ALL MUST HELP

No Reason For Bitterness Between Two Provinces, Claims Speaker.

Rev. Perry Dobson, principal of Alma College, St. Thomas, a member of the local Kiwanis Club, addressed the Kiwanis Club members at their weekly noon-day luncheon in the Tecumseh House today.

Kiwanian Dobson cited various incidents connected with the Kiwanian Club since he has been a member. "I am glad to be a member of such an organization. One of the club's biggest issues is to teach the people to live together. It is a big movement and the concerted action of every member of all the big organizations is necessary to make it a success," he declared.

"To make it possible for people to come closer together it is necessary that the barriers existing between Quebec and Ontario and the United States and Canada be removed."

Almost Unintended.

"Early in the country's history surveyors planned a track dividing Canada and the United States. The track could be seen running up hills and down dales, and it was dotted with cement posts, and now that is practically all that remains, a mother nature almost obliterating the trail."

"It is up to every member of these businessmen's organizations to assist in bridging the gap between our provinces. No matter how small our influence, it will have some bearing on these big questions if applied in the right manner."

"Although our neighbors are of a different color or race they have the same feelings as we have. They like freedom and are glad to be living. There is no reason why there should be that bitterness and narrowness that apparently exists between Ontario and the province of Quebec," concluded Kiwanian Dobson.

W. Casson, S. F. Howard, David Allen and L. M. Houlding, who had in charge the Kiwanian camp at Sage's farm, 513, 515 and 517, were each presented with a gold signet ring, bearing the Kiwanian Club emblem, in appreciation of the good work they had accomplished. Mr. Howard made a speech, outlining what work had been done and the influence that such a camp has on the children.

Miss Nettie Jones delighted the Kiwanians with a selection of solos. F. W. Willgoose was accompanist.

GLASS WAS GIVEN PRAISE DUE OTHERS

"In 1917," commented City Treasurer Bell today, "under the recommendation of the board of control, the city of London acquired the property of the disposal of the Government on the condition that a hospital be established."

Mayor E. S. Little was chairman of the board in question, the other members being Messrs. Moore, Saunders and Merryfield.

COUNCIL MEMBERS ARE ARRESTED FOR REFUSING TO RAISE THE TAX RATES

London, Sept. 2.—Demonstrations in which many thousands of London's unemployed participated, occurred last night, and marked the culminating point of unrest among the idle, which has prevailed here during the past several weeks. Members of the borough council of Poplar, a section of London, were arrested and lodged in Brixton for refusing to raise the tax rates in accordance with an order from the London county council which had taken action to raise funds to care for the destitute. The arrest of the remainder of the council members, some of them women, was expected today.

The Woolwich board of guardians was asked by a deputation of a monster demonstration to pay 25 shillings a week to each unemployed man and woman who had spent a night in the shillings for each child. Demand was also made that rents should not be collected from men out of work. These demands were rejected by the board.

Several men who had spent Wednesday night in a workhouse in Hackney, refused to leave in the morning. They were arrested and later sentenced to a week's imprisonment. Belief was expressed today that a royal commission would be created for the purpose of conducting an inquiry into the question of taxes, and the equalization of rates for the relief of the poor.

LONDON'S BORROWING FAR FROM EXHAUSTED, SAYS CITY TREASURER

"Statements Made To Contrary Are Entirely Erroneous and Misleading," Declared Mr. Bell—Figures Quoted Showed the City's Financial Standing Sound.

"That is entirely erroneous and misleading," commented City Treasurer Bell, commenting on the statement that "the city's borrowing power was fast becoming exhausted."

The following is a complete concise report from the office of the city treasurer:

Assessment and Debenture Debts.

Assessed value of taxation made in 1920, \$53,556,246.

The total debenture debt to date, including the city's portion of local improvement debentures (\$305,551.39) is \$10,700,750.17.

The net debt against borrowing power under the city of London act of 1906 is \$8,243,905.12.

The limit of borrowing power as per section 22 of this act is 14 per cent of the assessed value of whole rateable property, as shown by the last revised assessment roll, which sum is \$53,556,246, equal to \$7,553,874.44.

Therefore, the amount still necessary to reach limit of borrowing power is \$1,909,965.32.

Far From Exhausted.

This is not the case, Mr. Bell declared, not include the waterworks and electrical debentures, the former \$1,231,131.13 and the latter \$355,892.05, which could be added, he points out, to the city's present borrowing power. He desires to express, said to this again, he says, 14 per cent of a sum in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000, which will be the city's increased assessment in 1921, and you have the additional sum of \$810,000. This would bring the total borrowing power of the city, if deemed necessary, to \$3,525,235.39. "Very far,"

Munroe, of Sacramento, Cal.; Mrs. John Graham of this city, and Miss Jennie at home; two sons, R. F. Leake of Sacramento, Cal.; F. P. Leake of Ingersoll; and one sister, Mrs. J. C. Black of Sacramento, Cal. The premier of Alberta, Hubert Greenfield, is a nephew.

ADVISES METHODISTS TO ATTEMPT REFORM OF MODERN DANCE

Chicago, Sept. 2.—Dancing masters, having failed in their efforts to design a dance which would meet with the approval of the Methodist Church and cause it to lift its ban on dancing, Dr. C. H. McCrea, assistant editor of the Northwestern Christian Advocate, a church publication, suggested today that Methodists now undertake to reform the dance. He suggested, in an editorial, some form of mutual athletics that will save all that is harmless and provide all that is lacking in social life of young people of both sexes."

GERMANS STILL POSSESSED OF VIVID IMAGINATIONS

London, Sept. 2.—There are many in Germany who think a "trial of military strength" between Great Britain and France is not far distant, if they should come to cooperate. It is declared by John Eloff Boodin, professor of philosophy at Carleton College, Minn., in a lengthy interview published in the London Times.

Professor Boodin has been visiting Germany. In his opinion, the old spirit of German "kultur" still lives in the educated circles of Germany.

CITY PUPILS DO NOT HAVE TO PAY FEES

All Citizens Will Be Taxed Instead—County Must Pay.

Senior Public School Inspector C. B. Edwards announced definitely today that the city pupils attending the college institute here, citing the high schools act as authority for his statement.

He quoted section 1 of the regulations: "No fees shall be payable by pupils attending a high school which they have a right to attend under the provisions of this act. Pupils other than above referred to attending high schools shall pay such fees as the board may prescribe, but such fees shall not be greater than the average cost per pupil for education on the high school."

"It simply means that there will be no fees charged city pupils or county pupils," interpreted the inspector, "but tuition of the latter children must be paid for by the county, as they have a right to attend our collegiate under certain conditions, namely, payment of a fee laid down by the board of education, which gives the pupils that right. The fees for city pupils will be made up by taxing all the people in the city."

WOOD ACCEPTS POSITION.

Manila, Sept. 2.—Maj.-Gen. Leonard Wood today announced his acceptance of the post of governor-general of the Philippines tendered to him by President Harding.

TURKISH NATIONALIST FORCES WITHDRAWING BEFORE GREEK DRIVE

Constantinople, Sept. 2.—Turkish Nationalist forces, which have been fighting a desperate battle against the

Greeks in the loop of the Sakari River in Asia-Minor, are withdrawing toward Angora. Both the Greeks and the Turks have suffered heavily during recent fighting, but the Turks were outnumbered, being able to bring only seventeen divisions into the battle line against the entire Greek army.

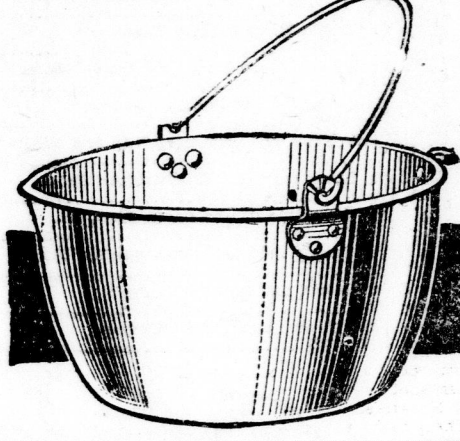
