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SPEND FIFTY YEARS OF MARRIED LIFE

Mr. and Mrs. Dillon, Dereham, Celebrate Anniversary.

An event of unusual interest took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. K. Dillon, concession 8, Dereham, on Monday, Dec. 25, when they celebrated the 50th anniversary of their wedding day. On Dec. 25, 1871, Mr. Dillon was married to Victoria Cole at the home of the bride's father, Mark Cole, concession 8 of North Dorchester.

The children present to celebrate the golden wedding were: Mrs. George McClintock, Brownsville; Mrs. Sherman Esselton, Culloden; Mrs. D. Scott, Glenora; Mrs. C. C. Francis, Toronto; and Thomas at home. There were also present the sons-in-law, eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
After the bountiful dinner the Christmas presents from the tree were distributed, and the day spent in games and music, Mr. Dillon playing several selections on his violin.
Mr. Dillon was born in the beautiful county of Wicklow, Ireland, and at the age of four years came to Canada with his parents and one brother, two years old. They crossed the Atlantic in a sailing vessel, which took seventeen

weeks to make the voyage. Landing in Quebec, they came to Hamilton by boat, and from there to Ingersoll by lumber wagon, from Ingersoll to Dereham Forge (near Tillsonburg), by stage, and on foot to Brownsville.
Mr. Dillon's father did not live long in the new land. Eight years after his arrival he was killed by a tree while chopping in the woods, leaving a wife and family of six children, the youngest, a babe of two weeks. Richard, being the eldest, worked and helped his mother keep the family together. In 1868 he started farming on concession 9 of Dereham, one mile south of his present homestead. Three years later he married, and lived on concession 9 one more year, then rented his present farm, which he finally bought. There was only a small frame house

and barn on the place when they first took possession. Mr. Dillon recalls the early days of his farm life, when the grain was sown by hand and oxen used instead of horses to till the soil and haul the wood and logs. The grain was harvested by means of the cradle, and often threshed with the flail.
Mr. Dillon's farm at one time was evidently a camping ground for the redmen, as many Indian relics have been found while plowing in the fields. Among the collections, which he has, are flint arrow points, Indian pipes, skinning stones, clay pottery and a stone hammer.
The village of Culloden, located one and a half miles east, was at one time very prosperous, and consisted of a sawmill, cheese-box factory, wagon factory, blacksmith, general store, ho-

tel, church and school. As time passed and the forest was cleared the sawmill, cheese-box factory and wagon factory became idle, and finally were closed up.
Mr. and Mrs. Dillon are enjoying fairly good health. They received several cards of congratulation from friends at a distance, and their friends here united in wishing them many happy returns of the day.

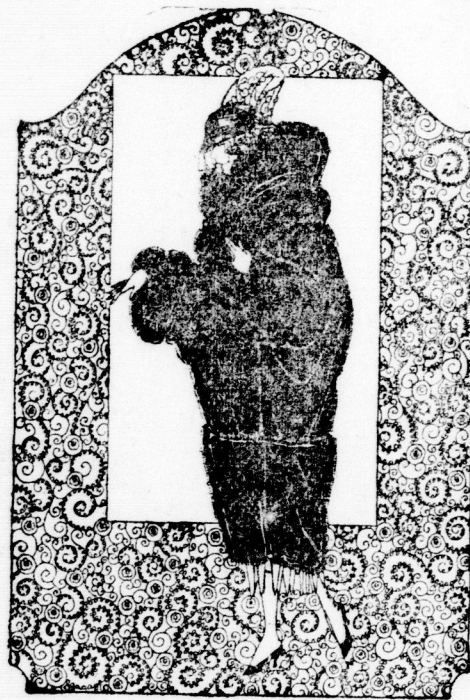
