BELIEVE COUPLE KILLED IN BARN

Alleged Affidavits Bring Out
Different Phase in Dual
Slaying.

Police Say Investigations of
Building Have Revealed Im-
portant Clues.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J., Oct. 18.—Affidavits have been obtained from two men whose identity the authorities refuse to divulge, county prosecutors said tonight, which set forth that the double murder of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills did not occur in the Somerset county orchard where the bodies were found, but in a barn on the southern outskirts of New Brunswick.

Investigation which followed the filing of the affidavits, the authorities said, led to the discovery by the police of two handkerchiefs, one a man's and the other a woman's, held to be important clues in the case. They were not found on the Phillips farm, as was reported at that time, but in the barn which stands on the opposite side of New Brunswick. Two dark brown combs also are said to have been found on the dirt floor of the barn. These combs, Charlotte Mills is reported to have identified as having belonged to her mother.

The statement which the authorities alleged they have obtained from the two men, professed to declare that they were driving from Red-bank, N.J., about 12 o'clock on the night of Sept. 14. Two miles out from New Brunswick, they said, they passed the barn, a deserted structure plastered with advertising posters, which stands close to the highway.

Report Hearing Screams.
From this barn the men are reported to have said they heard screams issuing, pleas for mercy, and then one long shriek—"Murder!"—the police say. The men drove through New Brunswick without reporting the occurrence, and an hour later were on Easton avenue when they were passed by a sedan going toward the Phillips farm. In the machine, they said, was a woman wearing a gray coat, and a man.

The affidavit is said to state further that the men were on Easton avenue, near the park, which adjoins the Phillips farm, for nearly half an hour, and that they saw the sedan returning at a high rate of speed. It turned from Easton avenue near the park and disappeared.

That the examination of Mrs. Hall, the widow of the rector, in the prosecutor's office, when she was closely scrutinized by a woman whose identity has not been fully revealed, was even more eerie and mystifying than at first reported, became known in connection with the announcement of the obtaining of the affidavit. This woman, the prosecutors now say, was but a decoy. Sitting directly across the room, she was supposed to absorb all of the attention of Mrs. Hall, while the rector's widow was being closely examined by the two men who are now said to have made the affidavit. The authorities have declined to make public the result of this elaborate plan for examining Mrs. Hall.

Publish Letters.
A second series of the letters said to have been written by Mrs. Eleanor Mills, wife of the church sexton, and choir leader to the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, was made public today by the authorities as they continued their efforts to solve the mystery of the slaying of the couple September 14.

Unaddressed and unsigned, the letters are filled with terms of endearment. In them the minister is often referred to as "sweet, adorable babykins." They speak of "a love nest" of a woman's dreams of true love, and describe the moods of a woman loved and loving without the conventions. Excerpts follow:

"Dearest, dearest boy:
"Wasn't I happy to find a sweet note, for I didn't expect you would risk leaving one for me yesterday? Such delicious ecstasies.
"Oh, you sweet, adorable babykins of mine."
"The note I left yesterday was crumpled, but I had to hide it in small orange purse as I met him."
"How glad I am school resumes tomorrow, and I can be alone to write. I need my dream times, my hours alone and other people irritate and disturb me."
"My Love is Deep."
"My love is deep, calm, quiet today. I am in a mood to listen to music."
"I am not sad, but quiet. Yesterday I was rollicking—oh, how I love these moods. They mean intense life."
"I'd build a waiting love nest, x x x people would mean nothing. I had rather watch the bugs and ants as they crawl along. Don't you love to watch an ant as it creeps along, honey?"
"I know I'm a crazy cat—Charlotte talks—then Don asks questions, then annoys, so how can I write?"
"How friendly your Easton avenue road seems to us and, dearest boy, every time you take your hat off I never fail to notice and can read your face."
"Sweetheart, my true heart, I could crush you. Oh, I am wild tonight."
"One time I told you I hated your work—I hated your parish. I guess it is because I am jealous of it, because it must come first in your life. Oh, I know it because you are a true priest—born for it."
"I have the greatest of all blessings—a noble man's deep, true, eternal love, and my heart is his—my life is his—all I have is his. x x x I am his forever."
"I will hate the winter nights. Then I dream of curling up in a chair with you. Oh, what dreams I have. Will it ever be?"
"I am holding my sweet babykins' face in my hands and looking deep into his heart and reading there the message that makes me live—makes me strength and life."

Farmers Seek His Political "Scalp"

EDMONTON, Oct. 18.—Asserting that Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the Progressive party in the federal house, is negotiating an alliance with the Liberals, thereby seeking to destroy the identity of the Progressive party, the Stony Plains district local of the United Farmers of Alberta has passed a resolution demanding his resignation.

The resolution further states that Mr. Crerar refused to lead the Progressives as an opposition party in the House of Commons; that he is associated with a grain company, and that he was not in favor of the formation of the wheat board.

URGES FULL NAVAL POWER FOR BRITAIN

Admiral Beatty, At University
of Leeds, Favors Standard
of Washington Con-
ference.

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 18.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Admiral Beatty who received the honorary degree of doctor of laws at the University of Leeds today, in acknowledging the bestowal of the honor, said that Great Britain should fully maintain the standard of naval power laid down by the Washington conference.

The world recognized that the government's acceptance of the Washington standard was unimpeachable evidence of the British Empire's desire for peace, he said. The standards of strength adopted at the Washington conference were those which offered the brightest prospects for peace. It was an unfortunate factor of the present civilization, Earl Beatty continued, that fastidiousness proper means of self-defence did not make for peace, and Great Britain could not afford to relax altogether the precautions necessary to maintain her national and imperial interests. "With our burden of debt," said Earl Beatty, "we are unable to afford to do more than maintain the minimum necessary to assure our security. That minimum was laid down by the Washington conference, and we are not going to fall below it."

AUTO STRIKES MAN, BREAKS BOTH LEGS

John Currie of Strathroy Suffers
Severe Fractures in Motor
Accident.

ARKONA, Oct. 18.—A serious accident occurred which might have proved fatal when John Currie of Strathroy, brother of Mrs. James McChesney, after alighting from his auto, stepped in front of a car coming from the opposite direction. Mr. Currie was given first aid and carried into the house, and examination showed both legs broken, shoulder broken and other injuries. He was removed to London hospital in the Arkona ambulance, where he is progressing favorably.

BREAKS SPEED RECORD IN
ONE-KILOMETER FLIGHT

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Oct. 18.—Brigadier-General William Mitchell, assistant chief of the United States army air service, today set a new official world's speed record when he flew over a one-kilometer course at Selfridge Field at an average speed of 224.05 miles an hour in four heats. The test was timed by representatives of the Federation Aeronotique Internationale, thus making the record official.

General Mitchell drove the army Curtiss plane, which last week won the Pulitzer trophy and in which Lieut. R. J. Maughan later drove unofficially at a speed of 248.5 miles an hour.

The former world's record recognized by the federation was made in France last year by Sadi Lecoq, who piloted his machine at an average speed of 205 miles an hour.

DEFENDS STAND ON WHEAT BOARD

Hon. Thomas A. Low Declares
Government's Action
Justified.

Declares King Administration
is Protecting General
Interests.

TORONTO, Oct. 18.—Addressing the Dominion Millers' Association at their annual banquet tonight, Hon. Thomas A. Low, federal minister without portfolio, defended the government's action in indorsing the wheat board, a measure opposed by the millers as a whole. He maintained that the government would not be justified in obtaining the complete satisfaction of one group at the price of causing unrest and discontent in the western provinces. The action of the government was really beneficial to the millers, for it was decidedly to the advantage of the members of Canada's greatest industry that the large group of men producing their raw material should be contented.

The good faith of the government in its desire to guarantee the millers protection also was evidenced by the fact that the minister of trade and commerce, himself a miller, was interested in this legislation, and further by the fact that the flour and milling interests were exempted from certain clauses which might have been prejudicial.

The milling industry, he said, was one of Canada's foremost industries. Outside of one and a half million dollars in securities held in the United States, and one and a half million held in Great Britain, the industry was absolutely Canadian-owned. Her flour and milled products carried Canadian export trade into over 40 different countries. The flour exports of Canada rank first in a list of over 400 specific Canadian products.

The export trade in flour and mill products has shown a steady growth from \$2,000,000 in 1887 to the present volume of \$58,000,000 approximately in the last fiscal year. The Canadian mills are capable of producing over 134,000 barrels of flour every 24 hours. Yet with this splendid development Canada is milling on the average only about 70,000,000 bushels of her vast crop of 300,000,000 bushels of wheat. With the steady opening of greater transportation facilities and

the growth of foreign markets, there is no reason why the remarkable growth in the export of Canadian flour in the last 20 years should not be extended and the volume of export doubled in the next decade.

AGREEMENT SIGNED FOR NEUTRAL ZONE BOUNDARY

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 18.—The boundary commission for the Ismid peninsula, east of Constantinople, has completed its work satisfactorily. It was officially announced this afternoon, and a formal agreement covering the new neutral zone has been signed.
