DEATH OF DR. W. F. TOLMIE.

A FATAL DUEL.

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ASAINST THE IDAHO.—Our readers are familiar with the alleged facts in the case of many thousand dollars' worth of smuggled opium being captured upon the steamship Idaho some months ago. The ship was seized and bonds were given for release.
