

EMPLOYERS ORGANIZE FOR MUTUAL BENEFIT
Foundry and Machine Shop Owners of Pacific Coast Get Together

What, if perfected, will form the most important organization of foundry and machine shop owners ever formed in the west was recently launched at a meeting held in Portland, Ore., on Wednesday and Thursday of last week. Delegates representing employers in the iron working and metal trades of British Columbia, California, Oregon and Washington, employing over 25,000 skilled mechanics, apprentices and common laborers, gathered and drafted plans for the formation of a new organization to be known as the United Metal Trades Association of the Pacific Coast. The local branch of the Pacific Coast Iron and Metal Trades association, of which two local firms at least are members, was represented. The firms are the Victoria Machinery Depot and the B. C. Marine railway.
It was stated by a member of the two local firms that nothing definite had taken place, but that at a meeting of the local branch to be held this week the secretary, who attended the conference, will report, and it then will be decided what action shall be taken.
The objects of the proposed organization as stated by J. V. Peterson, of the Moran company, who was chairman of the gathering, is to promote and to protect the interests of the members representing all the important firms and corporations in the iron working lines and the metal trades of the Pacific coast. It will deal particularly with the scale of wages to be paid and the hours of labor, etc. The new organization will unite, he affirmed, all employers in the machine shops, foundries, brass works and the like of the coast.
