HOW DOES IT GO?
Next to a city lot harbouring for
two years the charred ruins of a
boarding house, stands a large empty
ware house, untenanted for three
years, two valuable properties but not
paying one cent interest to the unfor-
tunate owner, not a particle of profit

The owner of a dairy herd has one
cow that gave seventy-five dollars
clear profit last year above the feed
cost, but with milk at the same price
another cow made only \$2.29 profit.
And so it goes in many herds, over
thirty times as much profit made by
some cows as by others. It goes
worse in some herds, because there
has not been much effort to find out
how much milk each cow gives.
It is very easy to find out a request
to the Dairy Branch, Ottawa, will
bring record forms free of cost so that
any owner can soon determine what
each cow pays. See that you
get good interest, see that each cow
is a profitable investment. How does
it go in your herd?

CANADIAN HOMES MAY BE RATIONED

Each Province Likely to be
Asked to Draft a Standard of
Voluntary Regulations.

Toronto, Ont., May 16.—"The ques-
tion of rationing the homes has been
given a great deal of thought," Mr.
U. B. Thomson, Chairman of the Cana-
dian Food Board, told an audience of
three thousand people in Massey Hall
last night.

"We know the people do not want
any direct order for rationing their
homes," he added. "The best solution
of the difficulty he went on, had seem-
ed to the Board to be to ask the re-
sources committee of each Province
to draft a standard of voluntary regu-
lations for the homes of their re-
spective Provinces."

The Government, said Mr. Thom-
son, had agreed to supply Great Brit-
ain and her Allies with large quan-
ties of wheat and flour, between now
and July 1st. If they did, as he hop-
ed they would between the beginning
of the year and that date, they would
have shipped more than in the aver-
age past three years.

There was still a lot to be made up.
Of the total requirements of the Al-
lies the 1916 record showed that Can-
ada had supplied of beef only 2 1/2 per
cent, pork 8 1/2 per cent, butter 1 1/2 per
cent, and condensed milk 1 1/4 per cent.
Sir William Hearst, who presided,
read a letter he had just received
from Sir Arthur Currie, thanking him
for the patriotic resolution of the
Legislature forwarded to him, which
had been promulgated to the Cana-
dian Corps. General Currie said in
part:

"The days to come will undoubtedly
demand the fullest measure of sacri-
fice, not only from the troops in the
field, but from all the people at home,
and in order to achieve victory the
full weight of the Empire, both in
men and resources must be thrown in.
It is therefore, a source of the
greatest encouragement and satisfac-
tion to all to know that the people at
home are fully alive to the situation,
and resolved to do their full part, to-
wards attaining the great result."

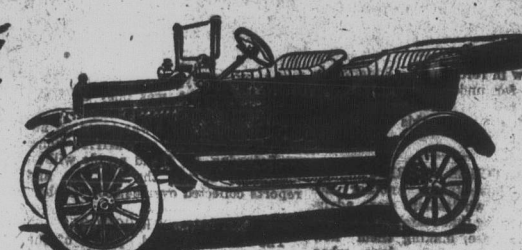
