## MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Couns. Wallace and Chamberlain Believed of All Responsible Matters.

Meeting of the Town Council was held Tuesday evening. The Worshipful Mayor presided. There were present: Couns. Wallace, Duncan, Chamberlain, St. George, Patterson and Bellefleur.

The reading of the minutes of four previous meetings took up the time for the first half of the meeting but they were all ratified. Coun. Wallace, objecting to this course, especially in reference to the meeting of Aug. 1st, at which meeting he and Coun. Chamberlain were illegally forced to vacate their seats. There were several interesting reports from Coun. Wallace and Coun. Bellefleur.

The W. H. Miller Co., Ltd., made application for 30 or 40 H. P. electric power for their mill, they to pay one of five beyond town limits. This matter was referred to the Electric Light Committee with power to advise.

M. P. Dixon, Clerk of the N. B. Executive Council, wrote that he had \$10,000 of the loaning scheme was available for Campbellton. Letter acknowledged and placed on file.

Mr. Dickson, Poor Commissioner, reported that he had placed a proper charge to board of \$4.00 per week, and also recommended payment of \$4.00 per week by Mrs. Smith so that she could be out of town.

Referred to Public Charities Committee for report.

Geo. Hickey wrote a letter asking for a grant to the Association and Appeal Committee.

Wrote to the following effect: "He could give an assurance that work would be done."

Coun. Bellefleur said that if the street to the town they should be made to do as at once. They had been given Victoria Street in exchange for this.

Coun. Patterson moved that the letter of Mr. Hickey be referred to the Town Council and that the Solicitor be instructed to take up the matter of this exchange of Victoria Street, which was the original Kings Highway and that he demand a 66-foot street from Ross Street to Water Street, and also look into the matter of compensation for the Railway authorities to do work on the street.

Referred to the Public Property and Streets Committee recommended that the Public Property and Streets Committee be given leave of remainder of town lot upon which his house stands at the rate of \$8.00 per year.

Referred to the Assessment and Appeal Committee.

Mr. Hickey wrote regarding the matter of moving of the balance due on moving of the town lot.

The annual Departmental accounts were passed.

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## PRELIMINARY HYDRO SURVEY

Assy Rock and Upsalquitch Were Visited By Engineers.

Last week H. W. Mahon, B. S., Assistant Engineer of the Dominion Water Power Board, with Town Engineer R. R. Beebe and an extensive survey of proposed Hydro developments for Restigouche and obtained much valuable information which Engineer Mahon will incorporate in his report to the New Brunswick Highway Commission.

The first place visited was Morriasy Rock, which after careful inspection was pronounced not feasible for development.

The next visit was made to Little Falls on the Upsalquitch. While the site had power possibilities it was not thought advisable to recommend development here because of various reasons, among which was the flooding of the I. N. R. and the highway.

The party visited Great Falls, about five miles above the Upsalquitch river. It was found that this site was very favorable. 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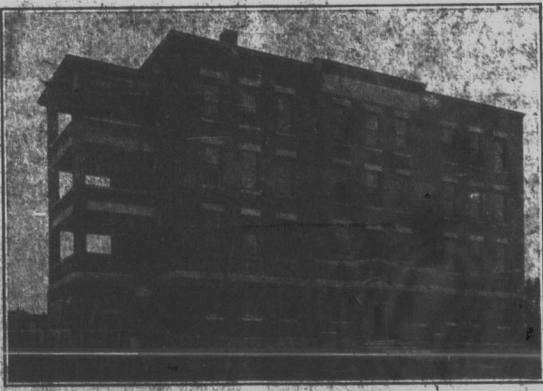
