THE LONG INQUEST ENDED A VERDICT OF MANSLAUGHTER BEIURNED

Against Samuel Cooper and William Ash-ley—The Evidence of Hugh Wise Criti-

ing the death of the young man Wm. Long on the night of July 12 last was concluded last night or early this morning, at Smith's hall in the Kingston road by Coroner Rid-del. The World has published the evidence in full from time to time at these enquiries in full from time to time at these enquiries and it is only necessary now to give some of the principal points of last night's enquiry. The jury after an hour's deliberation returned a verdist of manslaughter against Samuel Cooper and Wm. Ashbey, two of the young men now in custody. James Ferguson and Hugh Kelly were discharged, as there was no evidence against them.

The principal witnesses last hight were William McFadden, Charles Phillips and Hugh Wise. W. H. Murdook (Murphy & Murdook) represented Kelly and Ferguson, and J. R. Fullerton (Fullerton & Hall) appeared for Cooper and Ashbey. The hat worn by decessed on the night af the fatal assault was produced and identified by the brother of the latter. It was found on that night at Strange street and the Kingston road by McFadden. It was lying beside another hat which was claimed by Cooper, showing that deceased and Cooper must have been in a scuffle at or near the corner. [Mrs. Long testified seme time 'ago that after her son told her that he was nearly beaten to death in his own yard he started out to look for his hat and went as far as where it was found by McFadden—Ref.]—The evidence of Hugh Wise was severely criticised by the coroner, who, said that it was far from creditable for Mr. Wise to testify that he had went down Strange street that night and hearing a noise over a fence—the fence at decersed's house—to get over there, see three men quarrelling, tell the assailants "not to murder the man," and then tell the jury that he did not recognize any of the parties among the prisoners. Chas. Phillips testified that he also went over the fence shortly after Wise did. He recognized Cooper and Ashbey as the parties who were evidentally quarrelling with deceased in the garden. He saw them get over the fence and afterwards walk up with him and Wise to the Kingston road, where the hats were found. Cooper here elaimed his hat and witness took the other one—which afterwards turned out to belong to deceased—with him. The evidence against Cooper and Ashby as to their being in deceased's yard at the time of the alleged assault was very straight.

Cooper and Ashbey were committed by the coroner for trial at the next atsizes.
