Work and Wages: Members of trades unions are frequently reported as saying that labor, and not capital, is going to be the boss.

Work and Wages: The change so eagerly and so farily demanded by the Socialists, namely, all to the worker and little or nothing to the capitalist, seem to be the way of fulfillment if the present state of things continues.

Work and Wages: The argument, as condensed by the New York Sun, is that the unprecedented and continuous fall of prices during late years has led to the advantage of the workers who are still employed, and whose wages remain unaltered, while the business has been a positive and serious injury to employers.

Work and Wages: The incomes of capitalists have been steadily falling off, and in many cases have ceased altogether, but the workers are richer than ever, because they can buy more with their wages.

Work and Wages: The shareholders in many of the large manufacturing companies, proceeds the Engineer, "have received no dividends for some time past, and the whole of the earnings have gone to the workers, who have none of the anxieties arising from bad debts, deteriorating machinery and lost investments."

Work and Wages: But it is desirable for labor generally that this state of things should continue. The Engineer thinks not. It may be for the advantage of workers who are kept in employment; but what, it asks, must be the situation of those who can get no employment and whose number is increasing because of the disinvestment of capital?

Work and Wages: The low prices do not help those who are without work, for they can earn no money to buy at any price, and the less the consumption the worse their condition becomes, for the chance of getting work is less because of the decreased demand for production.

Work and Wages: It therefore argues that the maintenance of the present rate of wages both decreases the "wages" amount given in wages, and causes the whole amount to be absorbed by only a part of the workers, leaving the rest in misery.

Work and Wages: "If in a town of 10,000 working men and boys, with an average wage of \$1 a week," it says, by way of illustration, "half are unemployed, the total income is \$5000, to be divided among only 5000 men and their families, but if the other half are employed, the total income is \$10,000, and the wages are \$5000, and the rate of wages employment could be found for the whole number, the wages fund of the town would be at once increased to \$10,000, and the wages of each man would be reduced in accordance with present prices, and the number employed would be much greater."

Work and Wages: Such is the argument of this able professional journal, and the plea is well worth the careful consideration of all who are interested in the welfare of the people.

The Penitentiary in Jeopardy: The World believes in freedom of trade, and is free trade at home. In trying to regulate the penitentiary men and ice-cream makers, so that crimples and the weak only be allowed to peddle their wares, the world is measuring small potatoes in a small measure.

The Penitentiary in Jeopardy: The practical effect of Mayor Howland's proposal would be to make Toronto an asylum for all the crimples of Ontario. They would flock together under the wing of our philanthropic Mayor, and at every corner crimples would expose his distortion and his changes to the passer-by. The Mayor would be doing a better act if he took measures to compel these peddlers to sell fair fruit and sound ginger beer.

The Penitentiary in Jeopardy: One source of labor troubles on railroads has been touched upon in the labor investigation at Washington, and it is an evil that affects other interests besides those of workmen. This is the practice that has so long prevailed of watering the stock of railroad companies and attempting to earn dividends on capital vastly in excess of the cost of the roads. This necessarily leads in many cases to a restriction of expenses which involves the wages of laborers, the number employed, and the length of time each is obliged to work. It also increases the charges for transportation and thereby levies a tax upon the business of the country.

The Penitentiary in Jeopardy: A writer in the Ottawa Journal says Sir Charles Tupper's ambition runs to a seat in the Imperial Parliament, and if possible in the Imperial Cabinet, still retaining his Canadian Commissioner.

The Penitentiary in Jeopardy: The Montreal Herald has an article on the present aspect of the fishery dispute between Canada and the United States. The substance of the Herald's remarks are that the British Government is only the mouthpiece of Canada in negotiations on fishery affairs, and can deal with Canadian interests only as Canada permit them. Canada fully understands her position on this continent, her duty to the Empire and also her duty to herself, and will resist any refusal to be bullied by the States or tricked by British statesmen into any concessions without reciprocal compensation. We will negotiate on equal terms with the States, but we will not yield an inch to them.
