## Officers' and Soldiers, Debts

As applications continue to be received at District and Militia Head-quarters from tradesmem and individuals for assistance in the recovery of debts due to them by officers and soldiers serving in the Canadian Expeditionary Force or the Active Militia of Canada and by Officers' or Sergeants' Messes, Regimental Canteens, etc., it has been Regimental Canteens, etc., it has been found desirable to state publicly that the Military Authorities have no power to enforce payment and they are unable to assist in the recovery of private debts.

Therefore, all persons who give credit to officers and soldiers do so at

credit to officers and soldiers do so at their own risk.

Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and men are as amenable to the Civil Law of the Country as any other class of His Majesty's subjects, with this exception, that no execution can be taken against their person, pay, arms ammunition, equipment, instruments, regimental necessaries or clothing.
