THE PUBLIC HEALTH

A number of Paradise subscribers have called us up over the phone since our last issue, thanking us for our editorial of last week and we are pleased to state that conditions have already considerably improved. The school house has been fumigated, and a letter from one of the physicians was read in the church on Sunday, cautioning all to put forth every effort to prevent the spread of any disease. No new cases have been reported and on Monday the schools were re-opened.

We are pleased to report that the influenza in Annapolis County is decreasing.

The various health officers throughout the province are beginning to realize that they have considerable to do these times, besides drawing their annual grant of \$100.00. We copy the following from the *Hants Journal*: "When the Health Officer takes a shot at the local press he should ever bear in mind that there may be reaction when his opinion is not commendable of the highest praise. If other doctors within the town are not reporting to him in regard to influenza as they should, why does not he, as Chief Medical officer of the town see that the law is properly enforced in this connection? I have interned the law correctly, the Health Officer in his official position may command the local physicians to report. We have had what is termed flu in our midst for some three or four weeks and to this date the M.H.O. is unable to report the number of cases. Had not the Board of Health demanded this information, we may have been at sea for the rest of the winter."

IMPORTANT MEETING

Dr. J. W. Robertson, Ottawa, Canada's Agricultural representative at the Peace conference, Paris, and Prof. M. Cunningham, secretary for agriculture, Turin, will address a meeting to be held in the Demonstration Building, Lawrence town, on the 10th day of March, 1920 at 7:00 o'clock p.m. Subject of Dr. Robertson's address: The Peace Conference, the effect of the war on the market for agricultural products, consequent opportunities for profitable farming in Nova Scotia, etc. Dominion Atlantic Railway picture films will be shown at this meeting. This meeting is arranged jointly by the N.S. Department of Agriculture and the Dominion Atlantic Railway. A rare opportunity to hear one of Canada's experts is offered you. All who can should attend.

Dr. Robertson is a very eloquent speaker and probably as good an authority on agricultural production as we have in Canada. There should be a large delegation from Bridgetown to hear him.

No 97 train will be held at Lawrence town until 9:30 p.m. so that parties attending can return home as far west as Annapolis.

A similar meeting is to be held at Middleton in the Princess Theatre at 2:30 p.m. on the same date.

TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS

At a meeting held in Halifax, the object being to prevent accidents in industries, Carl D. Dennis, of the Canada Car and Foundry Co. was elected president. A meeting of the woodworkers and metal workers was held. W. G. Clarke, of Clarke Bros., Bear River, was chosen to be chairman of the lumbering and woodwork section, and W. H. Farnham, of the Canadian Woodworking Co., the Yarmouth was elected one of the vice chairmen. Another meeting is to be held in a few weeks to make further provision for the prevention of accidents in these industries.

The town of Chatham, N. B., purchased an electrical thawing outfit costing \$350.00.

Rev. R. M. Jost has sent in his resignation as Postmaster at Acadia, Yarmouth County.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association will at once start a campaign in favor of daylight saving.

The regular annual meeting of the Assessment Appeal Court for the town of Bridgetown was held last week.

For the first time in 75 years, the Montreal "Weekly Witness" will not publish this week. No paper is the reason.

The officers and members of Autumn Leaf Rebekah Lodge will institute a Rebekah Lodge in Digby next Monday night.

Mr. H. W. B. Warner, M. P., who resides in Plympton, Digby Co., recently sold a pair of three year old steers for \$400.00.

The W. M. A. S. of the Baptist church will meet at the home of Mrs. Burpee Chute, Tuesday evening March 9th, at 7:30 p.m.

In some way Dorothy Gillis' name was omitted from the results of Grade V published in our last issue. Dorothy's average was 60.

The School Board of Sydney will ask the City Council for at least \$50,000 for enlargement of school accommodation for the year 1920.

The half fare privilege which the Canadian Government Railways had in the past extended to the clergy was drawn on February 1st.

"The United Farmers Guide" is to be the name of the new farmers' paper to be started at Moncton in April with G. G. Archibald as manager.

Parliament met Wednesday in the new Parliament Building at Ottawa. The event is described as perhaps the most dazzling that Ottawa has ever seen.

Caledonia Gold Hunter: One day last week 67 loaded teams passed our office on the way to the railway station. The daily average for the week was 48.

The Council at Hollidayburg, Pennsylvania, has exempted from paying taxes for two years, ninety-eight soldiers of the town who served in France in 1919.

Daylight saving for Toronto from May 1 to Sept 30 is favored by the Board of Control and a recommendation to this effect was sent out to the City Council.

There is no immediate prospect for relief in the sugar situation. The February output of the Canadian refineries is much below normal and some of them are closed altogether.

The Woman's Institute will meet in the Board of Trade Rooms tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon, March 3rd, at 3 o'clock. All members are especially requested to attend promptly at the hour named.

Annapolis Spectator: It is rumored that the Granville people have become so keenly alive to the prospects of real estate development when the bridge is finished that there are no houses for sale and none to let.
